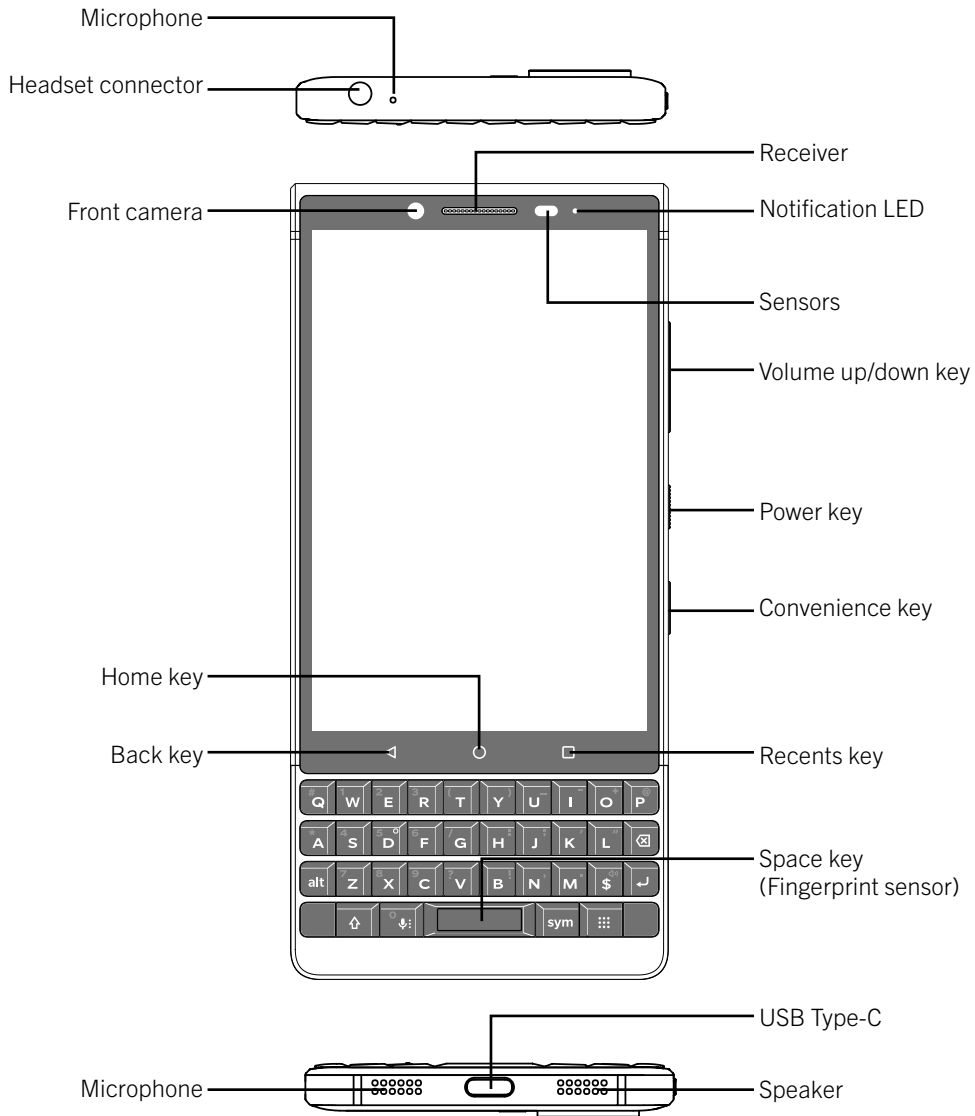
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# Setup and basics

## Your device at a glance



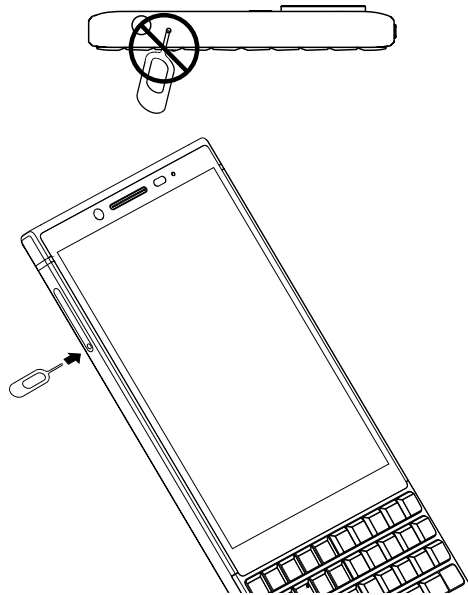
# Insert the SIM card

Your device uses a nano SIM card. If you don't have a SIM card or don't have the right type of SIM card, contact your service provider.

**CAUTION:** Do not use a larger SIM card that has been cut to a smaller size. Your device might not recognise it, or the SIM card might get stuck because it is thicker than a nano SIM card.

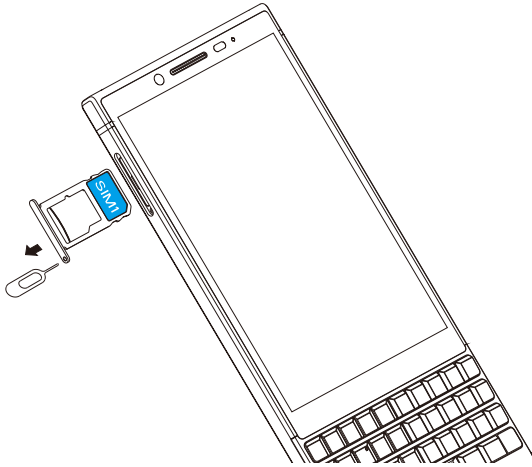
1. Release the tray by pushing the tip of the tool (provided in the box) into the hole on the right side of your device. If you don't have the tool that came with your device, you can also use a paper clip.

**WARNING!** Do not insert the SIM tool into the hole located at the top of the device as this is a microphone. If inserted, this may cause damage to your device.

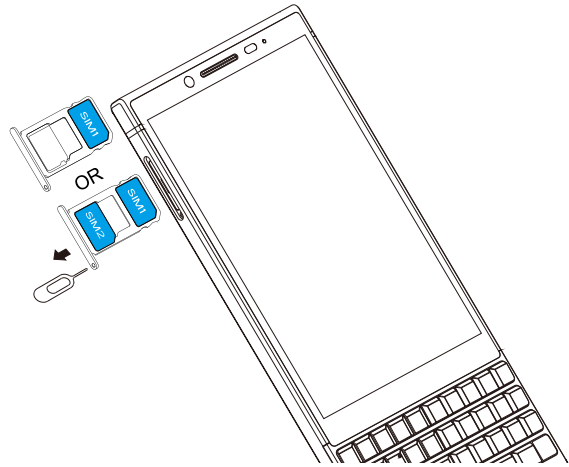


2. Pull out the tray completely and set it on a flat surface.
3. Hold the SIM card so that the metal contacts are facing away from you. Align the notch on the SIM card with the notch in the smaller section of the tray.

- Put the SIM card in the tray.



BBF100-1 Single SIM version



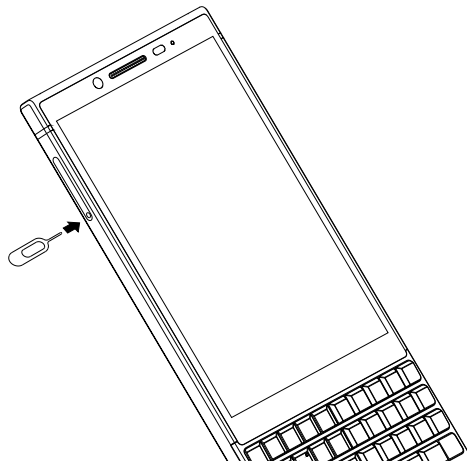
BBF1006 Dual SIM version

- Push the tray back into the slot.

## Insert a media card

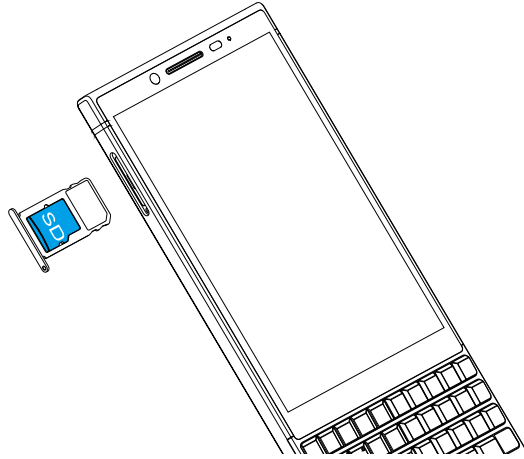
If you want more storage for pictures, videos, music, and documents, you can insert a media card (microSD card).

- Release the tray by pushing the tip of the tool (provided in the box) into the hole on the right side of your device. If you don't have the tool that came with your device, you can also use a paper clip.



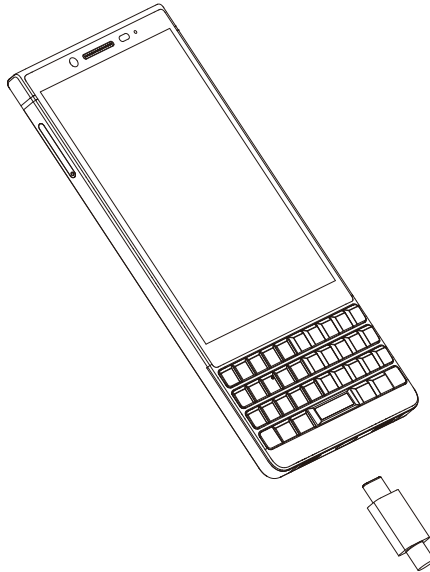
- Pull out the tray completely and set it on a flat surface.
- Hold the media card so that the metal contacts are facing away from you. Align the notch on the media card with the notch in the larger section of the tray.

- Put the media card in the tray.



- Push the tray back into the slot.

## Charging the battery



Connect the battery charger to your phone and power source respectively.

**Tip:** To reduce power consumption and energy waste, when the battery is fully charged, disconnect your charger; switch off Wi-Fi, GPS, Bluetooth or background-running applications when not in use; reduce the backlight time, etc.

**WARNING!** Please note your phone is a unibody device, the back cover and battery are not removable.

# Turn your device on or off

Press and hold the **Power on/off** key (on the right side of your device).

- To turn off your device, tap **Power off**.
- To turn your device off and then on again, tap **Restart**.

# Turn off the screen

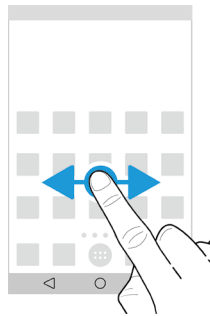
Press the **Power on/off** key (on the right side of your device).

To turn the screen back on, press the **Power on/off** key, or tap the screen twice.

# Move between home screens

You can move between your home screens with a gesture on the screen.

On the screen, swipe left or right.



# Get around with navigation buttons

No matter what you're doing on your device, navigation buttons appear at the bottom of your screen.

Do any of the following:

- To go back to the previous screen, tap ◀.
- To go to your home screen, tap ○.
- To see your recently opened apps and screens, tap ◻.

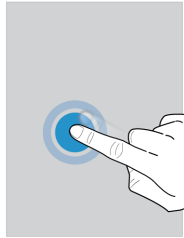


# Touch screen gestures

Take a moment to learn the common gestures that you can use on the touch screen.

## Wake up your device

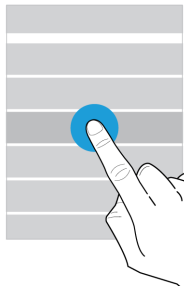
Tap the screen twice.



## Select items

Do any of the following:

- To select an item, tap it. If the item can be opened, it opens.
- To select multiple items, such as photos that you want to share or email messages that you want to delete, touch and hold one item, then tap additional items. To clear an item, tap it again.



## Scroll or move between items

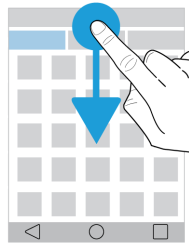
Slide your finger to scroll through a list or move between items, such as photos.



## Check your notifications

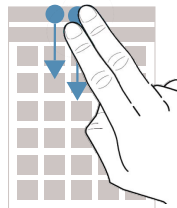
You can check your latest notifications (for example, email messages and text messages) at any time.

Swipe down from the top of the screen. Tap a notification to open it or pull down to see more notifications.



## Open Quick Settings

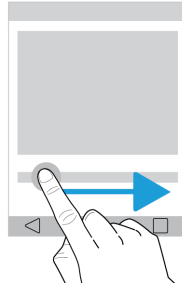
You can open Quick Settings to turn on or turn off common settings such as Wi-Fi and aeroplane mode. Swipe down from the top of the screen once using two fingers, or twice using one finger.



## Use a slider

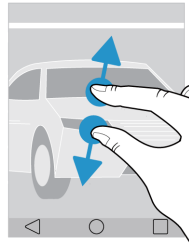
If a slider appears on your screen you can progress through a file, such as a song or video, or adjust a setting, such as the screen brightness.

Drag the slider handle to the right or left.



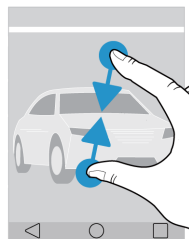
## Zoom in to or zoom out from the screen

If you want to see something in more detail, such as a photo or part of a map, you can magnify the image. To zoom in, slide two fingers apart.

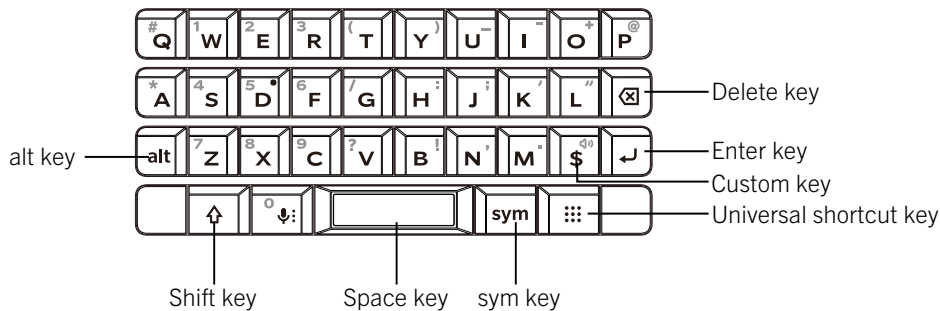


To zoom out, slide two fingers together.

**Tip:** In some cases, you can tap twice to zoom in or zoom out.



# Keyboard



## Select text

To select a word, double-tap it or touch and hold it.

To select more, or to change your selection, drag the selection handles  and .

## Switch the cursor

Double-tap the keyboard and then swipe left or right to switch the cursor.

## Delete a word

Quickly swipe left on the keyboard to delete a word.

## Type faster with suggested words

Suggested words appear while you type. They can appear above the keyboard or above a letter. To use a word, you can swipe up on the keyboard or flick the word up onto the screen.

## Type an alternate character or word

You can type an alternate character or word variant, depending on the input language that you're using on your device. Press and hold a letter key. Tap the character or word.



# Type numbers and symbols

Press the **sym** keyboard once to display the symbols soft keyboard, press twice to display the numbers soft keyboard, press again to hide the soft keyboard.

# Cut, copy, and paste text

When you select text, a text menu appears. Tap **Cut** or **Copy**, and then touch and hold where you want to paste the text, tap **Paste**.

# Switch your input language

1. To turn on input languages, swipe down from the top of the screen. Tap  > **System** > **Languages & input** > **Keyboard Settings** > **BlackBerry Keyboard** > **Input languages**. If the **Use system languages** switch is turned on, turn it off. Turn on the switch beside each input language that you want to use.
2. To switch between input languages while you type, press and hold the **Space** key and tap one of your previously selected input languages.
3. To switch to the last input method that you used, on the touch screen keyboard, swipe right across the **Space** key, or, on the physical keyboard, press the **alt** key and enter  key.

# For stock applications

In order to further improve the experience of using the keyboard, we have added some local application functions.

## In-coming call screen

Double click the **Space** key to answer a call.

(When **Settings** > **Accessibility** > **Space key answers call** is turned on).

## Calculator

- 0-9 key: input numbers
- +, -, \*, /, ., (, )
- Shift key: switch mode (simple mode > currency > unit)
- Enter key: =
- Delete key: delete

## List view


- T key: scroll to top of the list
- B key: scroll to bottom of the list


## Calendar


- T key: today
- W key: week view
- M key: month view
- D key: day (agenda) view
- A key: Agenda view
- S key: Search
- P key: Previous view (previous month, previous week, ...)
- N key: Next view (next month, next week, ...)
- G key: Goto (a day)
- C key: Create new appointment

## Custom key

To customise the  key, do the following:


1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Shortcuts & gestures** > **Customise the currency key** > **Currency**.
3. Tap one of the custom key options to set it as **Currency**, **Ctrl**, **Notification tray**, **Language switch** or **Shift**.

If you have set the  key as the Currency key, you also can change the type of currency used:

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **System** > **Languages & input** > **Keyboard settings** > **BlackBerry Keyboard** > **Advanced** > **Currency key**.
3. Tap one of the currency options shown.


# Apps, widgets, and shortcuts

## About apps, widgets, and shortcuts


When you tap  on your home screen, a tray opens where you can access installed apps and widgets and set up shortcuts.

- The **APPS** tab includes a complete list of the apps installed on your device, including apps that you download from Google Play™.
- **WIDGETS** are like miniature apps that you can often interact with on the home screen. For example, the BBM widget shows a small view of your current chats. The Bookmarks widget shows all of the websites that you have bookmarked so that you can open them right from the home screen.
- **SHORTCUTS** help you perform the tasks that you do most often. For example, if you frequently write emails, you can set up an email shortcut. Tapping the shortcut opens an email composer.

## Search for installed apps, widgets, and shortcuts

1. On the home screen, tap .
2. Enter a search term in the **Search apps, widgets and shortcuts** field.

## Add an app, a widget, or a shortcut to your home screen

1. On the home screen, tap .
2. Tap **APPS, WIDGETS, or SHORTCUTS**.
3. Touch and hold an app, a widget, or a shortcut, and then release your finger when the home screen appears.


After you add a shortcut to your home screen, you might be prompted to set up the shortcut. For example, if you add the Contact shortcut, you must tap the contact that you want to send an email to.

## Sort your apps

You can sort your apps in the Apps list in several different ways:

- **Default:** The ten apps that you use the most appear at the top, followed by an alphabetical list of your apps. If you're using Android™ for Work on your device, your work apps appear at the bottom of the list.
- **Alphabetical/Classic:** Your apps are sorted alphabetically.
- **Newest:** The apps that you most recently installed appear at the top.
- **Most Used:** The apps that you use the most appear at the top.


To change how your apps are sorted, do the following:

1. On the home screen, tap .
2. Tap the drop-down list that appears in the top-right corner. If you haven't changed how your apps are sorted, the word **Default** appears beside the drop-down list.
3. Tap a sorting option.

# About pop-up widgets

Pop-up widgets are associated with the apps that you add to the home screen. When you add an app that includes a pop-up widget, an indicator appears beneath the app icon (●●●). Pop-up widgets are useful because they allow you to have widgets that don't take up space on the home screen.

## Turn on pop-up widgets

1. On the home screen, touch and hold an empty area of the screen, and then tap .
2. Select the **Pop-up widgets** checkbox.



## Open a pop-up widget for an app

With pop-up widgets, you can access a widget for an app without having that widget on the home screen. If a pop-up widget is available for an app, an indicator (●●●) appears beneath the app icon.

On the home screen, swipe up or down on an app that has a pop-up widget.





## Turn off pop-up widgets

On the home screen, do one of the following:

- To turn off a pop-up widget, on the app icon, swipe up or down. In the upper-right corner of the widget, tap  > **Turn off Pop-up Widget**.
- To turn off all pop-up widgets, touch and hold an empty area of the screen, and then tap . Clear the **Pop-up widgets** checkbox.

## Change the shortcuts that you access with Keyboard shortcuts

You can change the shortcuts that you access with the Keyboard shortcuts. For example, you can set up a key to start an action, such as composing a message.


1. On the home screen, do one of the following:
  - Tap  > **Shortcuts** > **Keyboard shortcuts**.
  - Touch and hold an empty area of the screen, and then tap  > **Keyboard shortcuts**.
  - Swipe down from the top of the screen, tap  > **Shortcuts & gestures** > **Keyboard shortcuts**.
2. Tap **LONG PRESS** or **SHORT PRESS**.
3. Tap a circle  .
  - To set the key to open a different app, tap **Open app**, and then tap an app.
  - To set the key to call a contact, tap **Speed dial**, and then tap a contact.
  - To set the key to send an email or a text message to a contact, tap **Send message**.
  - To set the key to start an action, tap **All shortcuts**.





If you set up a key to open an app or use a shortcut, to turn off the key, do the following:

1. On the Keyboard shortcuts screen, tap an action.
2. Tap **Delete**.

## Universal shortcut key

You can quickly launch the Calendar or Note apps, or perform a specified action by typing the  key and a letter key simultaneously.

For example, if you have specified that a short press of the C key will launch the Calendar and a long press will launch your Contacts, you can do either of the following while running any other app:

- Short press the  key and C key at same time to launch Calendar.
- Long press the  key and C key at same time to enter Contacts.

# Phone and voice

## Phone icons

### During a call

## Find your own phone number

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **System** > **About phone** > **Status** > **SIM Status** > **My phone number**.

Your phone number appears at the bottom of the screen. If it doesn't appear, your service provider might not have added your phone number to your SIM card. For more info, contact your service provider.



# Change your ringtone

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Sound** > **Phone ringtone**.
3. Tap a ringtone, and then tap **OK**.



**Tip:** To use a song or a custom sound as your ringtone, move the .mp3 file you want to use to the **Ringtones** folder on your device. You might need to install a file manager app from the Google Play™ store first.

# Making calls


## Make a call

1. In the Phone app, tap .
2. Enter the number.
3. Tap .

## Call a recent number

1. In the Phone app, tap .
2. Beside a name or number, tap .


## Call a contact

1. In the Phone app, tap .
2. Tap a contact.
3. Tap the number that you want to call.

**Tip:** To send a text message to a contact, tap  beside the number.


## Speed dial a contact

For more info about speed dialling, see [Add a contact or number to your speed dial list](#).

1. In the Phone app, tap .
2. Tap a speed dial contact.




# Show or hide your number on outgoing calls

Depending on your service provider, this feature might not be supported.

1. In the Phone app, in the upper-right corner of the screen, tap .
2. Tap **Settings > Calls > Additional settings > Caller ID**.
3. Tap **Show number** or **Hide number**.



# View your call history

You can view past outgoing, incoming, and missed calls on the History screen.

1. In the Phone app, in the upper-right corner of the screen, tap  > **Call history**.
2. Do any of the following:
  - To see the details of a specific call, tap a name or phone number, and then tap **Call details** .
  - To view missed/Voice/Video calls, tap **MISSED**, **VOICE** or **VIDEO**.
  - To clear your call history, tap  > **Clear call history** > **OK**.

# Receiving calls


## Answer or dismiss a call

1. If your device is locked .
  - Swipe up  to answer a call.
  - Swipe down  to reject a call.
2. If your device is unlocked, in the call notification window, tap **ANSWER** or **DECLINE**.
2. When **Settings > Accessibility > Power key ends call** is turned on, press the **Power** key to dismiss the call.

## Send a quick response to a caller

You can send a caller a brief text message instead of answering an incoming call. Depending on the recipient of the quick response, additional text messaging charges might apply.


**Note:** If a call is from an unknown caller, the option to send a quick response does not appear.

1. When you receive an incoming call, swipe up  until it shows quick response message.
2. Do either of the following:
  - To send a default message, tap a message.
  - To compose a new message, type a new message at the **Write your own...** line, then tap **SEND**.

When you dismiss a call by sending a quick response, the caller is sent to voicemail. If you do not have voicemail, the caller receives a busy signal instead.

## Change your default quick response messages

You can create your own quick response messages to replace the available defaults.

1. In the Phone app, in the upper-right corner of the screen, tap  > **Settings** > **Quick responses**.
2. Tap the quick response you want to change.
3. Type a new message.
4. Tap **OK**.

To reset to the default quick responses, on the **Edit quick responses** screen, tap  > **Reset default app**.


## Silence the ringtone when you receive a call

If you receive a call while your sound or vibration notifications are turned on, you can quickly silence your ringtone and stop your device from vibrating. After you silence the ringtone, you can still answer or decline the call.

When you receive an incoming call, press the **Volume** key.



## Move a call from your headset to your device

When you have a Bluetooth headset connected to your device, incoming calls are automatically received on your headset. You can manually move the call back to the device.


1. While on a call, tap .
2. Do one of the following:
  - To move the call to your device, tap **Handset earpiece**.
  - To move the call to your device speakerphone, tap **Speaker**.


## Prevent calls from going to your Bluetooth headset

You can disconnect your Bluetooth headset from the Phone app so that calls are sent to your device instead.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen and tap .
2. Tap **Connected devices** > **Bluetooth**.
3. Beside the paired headset you want to disconnect, tap .
4. Clear the **Phone audio** checkbox.

## Put a call on hold



While on a call, tap .

To resume a call, tap  again.

# Blocking calls



## Block incoming calls

When you block calls, you won't receive calls or texts from the specified blocked phone number. Contact your service provider for more information.

1. In the Phone app, in the upper-right corner of the screen, tap  > **Settings** > **Call blocking**.
2. Tap **ADD A NUMBER**, enter a blocking phone number, tap **BLOCK**.
3. Tap  > **UNBLOCK** to remove the blocked number.


## Block a caller


Verify that the number you want to block is listed as a number for a contact in your Contacts app.

1. In the Contacts app, tap a contact.
2. Tap  > .
3. Select the **All calls to voicemail** checkbox.

## Block callers who aren't contacts

You can use the Priority only mode to ignore calls from callers who aren't contacts. Your phone doesn't ring when you receive a call from someone who's not in your contact list, but your device still lets you know that you missed a call.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen once using two fingers, or twice using one finger.
2. Tap  **Do Not Disturb** > **Priority only**.
3. Tap **MORE SETTINGS** > **Priority only allows** > **Calls** > **From contacts only**.

**Note:** By default, Priority only mode lasts for one hour. To change how long it lasts, swipe down from the top of the screen once using two fingers, or twice using one finger. Tap  **Do not disturb** > **Priority only**. To increase how long the mode stays on, tap **+**, or tap **Until you turn this off**.

## Limit the phone numbers that you can call



When you set up and use fixed dialling numbers, you can make calls and send text messages (SMS or MMS) only to the phone numbers that you add to the fixed dialling numbers list. For example, if you give your device to your child to use, you can limit the phone numbers that your child can call. To use fixed dialling numbers, your service provider must set up your SIM card for this feature. Depending on your service provider, this feature might not be supported.

1. In the Phone app, in the upper-right corner of the screen, tap .
2. Tap **Settings** > **Calls** > **Fixed Dialling Numbers**.



3. Tap **Enable FDN**.
4. Enter the SIM security code provided to you by your service provider.
5. Tap **OK**.
6. Tap **FDN list** > **:** > **Add contact**.
7. Type a name and phone number.
8. Tap **SAVE**.

## Add a contact or number to your speed dial list

Contacts that you add to your speed dial list appear in the ★ tab in the Phone app.

1. In the Phone app, tap .
2. Tap the picture or letter beside a contact's name.
3. Tap .

## Remove a contact or number from your speed dial list

1. In the Phone app, tap .
2. Touch and hold the contact you want to remove.
3. Drag the contact over  **Remove**. Release your finger.

## Call waiting and call forwarding


### Turn call waiting on or off

Depending on your service provider, this feature might not be supported.


1. In the Phone app, in the upper-right corner of the screen, tap **:**.
2. Tap **Settings** > **Calls** > **Additional settings**.
3. Turn on/off the **Call waiting** switch.

### Set up call forwarding

Depending on your service provider, this feature might not be available.





1. In the Phone app, in the upper-right corner of the screen, tap .
2. Tap **Settings** > **Calls** > **Call forwarding** > **Voice** or **Video**.
3. To change the number that your calls are forwarded to, tap a call forwarding option and type a number.

## Start a conference call

1. While on a call, make or answer another call.
2. To merge the calls, tap .

## Answer a second call while already on a call



Verify that call waiting is turned on.

1. While you are on a call and receive a second call, do one of the following:
  - To put the first call on hold and answer the second call, swipe up  to answer a call.
  - To end the first call and answer the second call, swipe up .
2. Tap  to switch the first call and the second call.
3. To merge both calls and start a conference call, tap .

To add more people to the conference call, repeat steps 1 and 3.



## Make another call while already on a call

When you make another call while you're already on a call, your first call is automatically put on hold.

1. While on a call, tap .
2. Do any of the following:
  - Use the dial pad to enter a number.
  - Tap above the dial pad to go to the Phone screen. Tap a contact.
3. To merge both calls and start a conference call, tap .

To add more people to the conference call, repeat steps 1 to 3.

## Remove people from a conference call

1. While in a conference call, to view the conference call participants, tap **Manage**.
2. Do one of the following:
  - To remove a person from the conference call and hang up, tap .
  - To remove a person from the conference call and keep them in a separate call, tap .




# LTE calling

## Turn on Voice over LTE and LTE video calling





Voice over LTE and LTE video calling provide high-definition voice and video calling using 4G LTE connections. To use LTE video calling, you must turn on Voice over LTE.




Depending on your service provider, this feature might not be supported. For more information, contact your service provider.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap .
3. Depending on the available options, tap **Network & Internet** > **Mobile networks** > **IMS settings**.
4. Turn on the **Voice over LTE** or **LTE video calling** switch.


## Make an LTE video call

If your service provider supports LTE video calling, you can make a video call to contacts who have this feature.

1. In the Phone app, do one of the following:
  - To dial a number, tap , and then enter the number.
  - To call a contact, tap , and then tap a contact.
  - To call a speed dial contact, tap , and then tap a contact.
2. Tap .

**Note:** Depending on your service provider, you might not be able to make an LTE video call to a contact directly from  or . Instead, call the contact, and then after the call connects, tap .

## Switch to a voice-only call

During a video call, tap  > **Voice only**.

To switch back to a video call, tap  again.

## Switch between the front-facing and rear-facing camera

During a video call, tap  to switch cameras.

## Put a video call on hold

During a video call, tap  to put the call on hold.



## Share video one way

During a voice call, you can share video with the contact you're talking to, if they also have the LTE video calling feature, but the contact doesn't have to share video with you.

During a voice call, tap  **One way camera**.

## Answer an LTE video call

When you receive a video call, do one of the following:


- To answer the call as a video call, swipe up  to answer a video call.
- To answer the call as a voice call, swipe up  button on the left to answer a voice call.

## Wi-Fi calling

### Turn on Wi-Fi calling



Your device might be able to make and receive calls over Wi-Fi networks, even if you have limited or no mobile network coverage.

Depending on your service provider, this feature might not be supported. Contact your service provider for more information.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Network & Internet** > **Wi-Fi calling menu**.
3. Turn on the **Wi-Fi Calling** switch.
4. To see when your device will make Wi-Fi calls, turn on **Wi-Fi Calling Status**.
5. Tap **Wi-Fi calling preferences** > **Connection preferences**.
  - To use a Wi-Fi network, even when you have a mobile signal, tap **Wi-Fi preferred**.
  - To never use a mobile network and only use a Wi-Fi network, tap **Wi-Fi only**.
  - To only use a Wi-Fi network for calls when you don't have a mobile signal, tap **Mobile network preferred**.

### Make a Wi-Fi call


Make sure that  appears at the top of your screen.

1. In the Phone app, tap .
2. Enter the number.
3. Tap .

# Voicemail

## Set up your voicemail

Depending on your service provider, this feature might not be supported. Contact your service provider for more info.

1. In the Phone app, in the upper-right corner of the screen, tap .
2. Tap **Settings** > **Voicemail**.
3. To set up voicemail, tap **Advanced settings** > **Setup**. If the **Voicemail number** field is blank, tap **Voicemail number**, and then enter your voicemail access number. If you don't have a voicemail access number, contact your service provider.

To call your voicemail from the Phone app, touch and hold **1** key.

## Visual Voicemail

Visual Voicemail is another way to access and manage your voicemail. In an app, you can see and scroll through your messages on your device. Some Visual Voicemail services can also transcribe your voicemail messages into text and send messages over email and SMS.

Your service provider might have a Visual Voicemail app preloaded on your device or available for you to download.

# Applications and features

## Download an app from Google Play™

1. Open the Google Play™ store app.
2. If necessary, sign in with your Google™ account.
3. Browse or search for an app that you want to download.
4. Tap the app, and then tap **Install**.

## Organising your home screen

### Move an app, a widget, or a shortcut around

1. Touch and hold an app, a widget, or a shortcut, and then drag it to a new spot.
2. Release your finger.

### Move an app or a shortcut to the favourites tray

The favourites tray appears at the bottom of each home screen, giving you easy access to your favourite apps or shortcuts. You can add up to four apps or shortcuts to the favourites tray.

1. If the favourites tray is full, touch and hold one of the apps or shortcuts in the tray. Drag it to a spot on the home screen.
2. Touch and hold the app or shortcut that you want to add, and then drag it to the favourites tray.


### Add a home screen

You can add as many home screens as you want to organise your apps, widgets, and shortcuts.


1. On the home screen, touch and hold the item that you want to move, and then drag it to the right edge of the screen.
2. Hold the item at the right edge of the screen until the next home screen appears. If necessary, continue to hold the item until a blank home screen appears.
3. Release your finger.

**Tip:** To view different home screens quickly, tap the circles that appear above the favourites tray, and then slide your finger left or right.

## Change the default home screen

Change the home screen that is displayed when you turn on your device or when you tap .

**Note:** You might have to tap  twice to open your default home screen.

1. On the home screen, touch and hold an empty area on the screen.
2. Above the home screen that you want to set as your default, tap .

## Delete a home screen

If you're not using one of your home screens, you can delete it. If you delete the default home screen, the home screen to the right becomes the default home screen.


**Note:** After you delete a home screen, you can't restore it.


1. On the home screen, touch and hold an empty area of the screen.
2. Touch and hold the home screen that you want to remove, and then drag it to the **Remove** bar at the top of the screen.

## Organise apps and shortcuts into folders


1. On the home screen, touch and hold an app or a shortcut.
2. Drag the app or shortcut on top of another app or shortcut that you want to include in the same folder.
3. To name the folder, tap the folder. Tap **New folder**, and then enter a name.


## Change how you view your recent apps and screens

When you tap , you see a tiled view, a masonry view, or a rolodex view of your recent apps and screens. You can change the view to suit your preferences.


1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Display** > **Recents**.
3. Select a view.

## Uninstall an app or remove an app, a widget, or a shortcut from a home screen

If you uninstall an app, the app is no longer available on your device. You must reinstall the app if you want to use it. Some built-in apps can't be uninstalled; instead, you can turn off these apps so that they no longer appear in  and so that you no longer receive notifications from them.

If you remove an app from the home screen, the app is still installed on your device, and you can open the app from .

1. Touch and hold an app, a widget, or a shortcut.
2. Drag the app, widget, or shortcut towards the top of the screen.
  - To uninstall an app, drag the app towards **Uninstall**.
  - To turn off an app, drag the app towards **Disable**.
  - To remove an app, a widget, or a shortcut from the home screen, drag the app towards **Remove**.

You can use the Google Play™ store to reinstall apps that you uninstall. In the Google Play™ store, tap  > **My apps & games** > **All**.


You can turn on apps that you turned off in  > **Apps & notifications**. At the top of the screen, swipe left on the categories until you see the **Disabled** category. Tap an app, and then tap **Enable**.



# Messages


## Using Messages

You can use the default Messages app on your device to send, receive, and manage text messages, including SMS and MMS messages.

### Send a text message


1. In the Messages app, tap .
2. In the **To** field, enter a mobile phone number or start typing a contact's name.



**Tip:** tap  or  to switch between your contacts list and the keyboard.






3. After entering a mobile phone number, tap **Send to XXX**.
4. In the **Text message** field, type your message, and then tap .




**Tip:** You can add an emoticon by tapping  in the message field.

### Send a multimedia message

1. In the Messages app, tap .
2. In the **To** field, enter a mobile phone number or start typing a contact's name.

**Tip:** tap  or  to switch between your contacts list and the keyboard.


3. After entering a mobile phone number, tap **Send to XXX**.
4. Tap  and attach a media file:
  - To attach a sticker, tap . You can also download other stickers and attach them.
  - To attach a picture you're about to take, tap . To expand the camera view to full screen, tap .
  - To attach a picture from your library, tap .

- To attach an audio message you're about to record, tap  , and then touch and hold  to record the audio.
- To attach your location, tap  .





5. Tap  .

**Note:** If you close the screen while composing a message, it is saved as a draft. You can tap on the conversation to resume typing the message.

## Delete a message


1. In the Messages app, touch and hold the message.
2. Tap  > **Delete**.

## Manage conversations

1. In the Messages app, touch and hold a conversation until a toolbar appears along the top of the screen.
2. Do any of the following:
  - To archive a conversation, tap  . To return the archived conversation to your message list, touch and hold the conversation, and then tap  .
  - To delete a conversation, tap  .
  - To turn notifications on or off, tap  or  .
  - To add a contact, tap  .
  - To block a number, tap  .

## Search for messages in the Messages app

You can easily search the Messages app for items, such as a contact, phone number, or message.

1. In the Messages app, tap  .
2. In the Search field, type your search term or terms.

# Camera




## Portrait mode

Thanks to the dual camera, we can provide you with a great portrait making experience.

## Telescope view

The basic wide view camera has a 12M F2.0 sensor and 1.25um pixel size. The 2nd camera is 12M with a telescopic lens.

The telescopic camera is mainly used outdoors to provide a 2x optical zoom, and also helps to generate a depth map when in Portrait mode.



1. Tap  > **Camera**.
2. Tap  > **Portrait**.
3. Move the device away from you up to a maximum of 2.5 metres, until the screen shows **DEPTH EFFECT**.
4. Tap  to take a photo.

## Private capture photos


User can take a picture or video by tapping the fingerprint sensor. Pictures or videos taken this way are saved to **Locker > Gallery** and won't be uploaded to the Cloud. Verification is required to enter Locker, for more information please refer to [Locker](#).

### Take private capture photos

Private capture photos are saved to the Locker automatically.

1. Tap  > **Camera**.
2. Tap , then turn on **Locker mode** switch.
3. Tap the **Space** key to take private capture photos.



### Review private capture photos

1. Tap  > **Locker**.
2. Enter security validation, for example your password or fingerprint.
3. Tap **Gallery**, all private capture photos are saved here.

## Clock

### Setting the alarm clock

#### Set an alarm





1. In the Clock app, tap  .
  - To set an existing alarm, tap the time shown on the alarm.
  - To create a new alarm, tap  .
2. To adjust the alarm time, tap the hour or minute. Touch and hold the dial, and then slide the dial to your desired time.
3. Tap **AM** or **PM**.



4. Tap **OK**.





## Create or delete an alarm

In the Clock app, do one of the following:



- To create an alarm, tap  > .
- To delete an alarm, under the alarm that you want to delete, tap  > .

**Tip:** You can add labels to your alarms to help you remember what each alarm is for.

## Change your alarm ringtone


1. In the Clock app, tap .
2. Under the alarm you want to change, tap  > .
3. Select a ringtone.
4. Tap .

## Set an alarm for multiple days

1. In the Clock app, tap .
2. Under an alarm, tap .
3. Select the **Repeat** checkbox.  
Days that the alarm is set to go off are indicated by a letter inside a white circle.
4. To add or remove a day, tap its letter.


## Set the snooze length

By default, the alarm snoozes for ten minutes.

1. In the Clock app, tap  > **Settings** > **Snooze length**.
2. Slide your finger up or down over the numbers.
3. Tap a time.


## Set the silence time

By default, the alarm is silenced after ten minutes.

1. In the Clock app, tap  > **Settings**.
2. Tap **Silence after**.
3. Tap a time.

# Set the Clock




## Set your home time zone

1. In the Clock app, tap  > **Settings**.
2. Tap **Home time zone**.
3. Tap a time zone.



**Tip:** If you would like the clock to update automatically to your current location's time zone when you're travelling, turn on the **Automatic home clock** switch.

## View the time for other locations

You can view the time for multiple locations on the clock screen.


1. In the Clock app, tap .
2. Tap .
3. Tap the locations that you want to appear on your clock screen.
4. Tap .

## Remove a location from the clock screen

1. In the Clock app, tap .
2. Clear the checkbox next to the location that you want to remove.
3. Tap .

## Switch to night mode

You can dim your screen and keep the time displayed like a bedside clock by switching to night mode. In the Clock app, do one of the following:




1. Tap  > **Screen saver**.
2. Touch anywhere on the clock screen to release screen saver mode.

## Change the clock style



To view the clock in either digital or analog format, in the Clock app, tap  > **Settings** > **Style** > **Analog** or **Digital**.

## Use the Stopwatch


1. In the Clock app, tap .

2. To start the stopwatch, tap  .
  - To pause the stopwatch, tap  .
  - To restart the stopwatch after it's been paused, tap  again.
  - To add a lap, tap **LAP**.
  - To reset the stopwatch, tap **RESET**.

## Set the Timer

1. In the Clock app, tap  .
2. Enter the time in hours, minutes, and seconds. For example, if you want to set an hour-long timer, type **1 00 00**.
3. To start the timer, tap  .

You can do more than just set your timer:

- To add an extra minute to your running timer, tap + **1:00**.
- To set another timer, tap **ADD TIMER**.
- To reset a timer, tap , and then tap **RESET**.
- To delete a timer, tap **DELETE**.

# BlackBerry Device Search



## Search your device

With the BlackBerry Device Search app, you can search your device for files, apps, help, and more. You can also type an Instant Actions command in the search field to perform a task quickly.

In the BlackBerry Device Search app, type a search term or an Instant Actions command.

## Change the search categories

To look for a specific type of file, you can specify categories to include in searches. For example, if you are looking for a song, you can clear all of the categories except Music.

1. In the BlackBerry Device Search app, tap  > **Search categories**.
2. To choose which categories to include in searches, turn on or off the switch.
3. Tap  .

**Tip:** The Extended Search category searches Internet results, cloud apps (such as Google Drive™ and Google Play™), other apps on your device, and more. To only search data on your device, turn off the **Extended Search** switch.


## Do more with your search results


You can perform a variety of actions with items in your search results right in the search results screen. The actions available to you depend on the type of item. For example, if one of the search results is an app, you can open the app directly from the search results screen.

1. Tap a search result.
2. If necessary, tap an action.

## Stop saving your search history

By default, your device keeps the last 20 search results that you visit for quick reference and reuse. If you don't want to save your search results, you can turn off this feature.

1. In the BlackBerry Device Search app, tap  > **Settings**.
2. Turn off the **Save search history** switch.

**Tip:** To delete an individual search result, swipe left or right on the result. To clear all of your search history permanently, tap  > **Settings** > **Clear search history**.

## Perform tasks quickly with Instant Actions

Instant Actions are shortcuts that allow you to perform tasks quickly.

**Note:** Instant Actions use the input language that is set on your device.

1. In the search field, type a command.
2. From the results, tap instant actions column menu.

### Make a call

You can call a contact or dial a phone number right from the search field.

Type **phone**, **dial**, or **call**, and then select **Make a call** to enter a contact name or phone number.

### Send an email

Type **email** or **mail**, and then select **Send an email** to enter an email address.

### Send a text message

Type either **sms**, **message**, **msg**, or **text**, and then select **Send a text message** to enter a contact name or phone number.

### Play music

Type **play**, select **Play Music** or YouTube, and then enter a song name, artist name, or album name.

## Get directions

Type **map**, and then select **Get directions** to enter the name of a business or address.

## Create a note

Type **note** or **memo**, and then select **Create a note** or **Notes** to enter a title for the note or view your notes list.

## Create a task

Type **task** and then select **Tasks** to enter a title or view your tasks list.

The Google™ app provides useful information when you need it through Google Now™ cards. Google Now™ cards contain personalised info, such as weather updates for your location, or directions to the next event on your agenda.

Now on Tap extends the features of the Google™ app to show you relevant information based on the app that you're using. For example, if you and a friend are using BBM to discuss meeting at a restaurant, Now on Tap can provide a card with ratings for the restaurant or directions to the restaurant. After you set up Now cards in the Google™ app, you can touch and hold  to access Now on Tap.

# Location services and Google Maps

## About location services

You can turn on location services so that location-based applications and services, like Google Maps™, can find your location. Location-based applications can use GPS technology and other positioning information to provide you with information, such as driving directions.

From the Location settings screen, you can also see the apps that are using location services. If you decide that you don't want an app to know your location, you can turn off location permissions for that app. For more information about turning app permissions on or off, see the help for [Security](#).


# Turn location services on or off

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Security & Location** > **Location**.
3. At the top of the screen, turn the switch on or off.

# Change location modes


With location modes, you can set how accurately your device detects your location. You can choose from the following location modes:

- **High accuracy:** Uses GPS, Wi-Fi networks, mobile networks, and Google™ location services to find your location accurately.
- **Battery saving:** Uses Wi-Fi networks, mobile networks, and Google™ location services to find your location, while conserving your battery life.
- **Device only:** Uses GPS only to find your location. This mode might use more battery life than battery saving mode, and might not be as fast as high accuracy mode.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Security & Location** > **Location** > **Mode**.
3. Tap an option.

# Turn Location History on or off

Location History is a Google™ service that creates a private map of where you go with your device, and uses the map to give you useful information, such as commute predictions and more relevant search results.


1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Security & Location** > **Location** > **Google Location History**.
3. If necessary, add your Google™ account.
4. At the top of the screen, turn the switch on or off.

# About Google Maps™

Google Maps™ helps you to find businesses, restaurants, and other places of interest, and can provide you with turn-by-turn directions to your destination.

## Printing



### Print from your device

You can print webpages, photos, documents, and more from your device using compatible Wi-Fi or Bluetooth enabled printers and printers connected to your computer. Not all applications support printing.

1. In an app, tap  > **Print**. Depending on the app, this option might appear in a different location, or might be called something different, such as **Share & export**.
2. Tap the top of the screen, and then tap the printer that you want to use.
3. Tap .



**Note:** You may have to install a printing service and add a printer before you can print.

## Install a printing service

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Connected devices** > **Printing**.
3. Tap **Add service**.
4. Tap the service that's compatible with your printer, and then tap **Install**. To find a compatible service, find your wireless printer's brand or consult its user guide.
5. Tap  twice.
6. Tap the printer service that you just installed. If the service isn't listed, swipe down from the top of your screen, and then tap the notification for your newly installed printer service.
7. Turn on the switch for that service, and then tap **OK**. Wait for the service to find printers automatically.

## Add a printer

In most cases, after you install a printer service, your device finds your printer automatically. If your device can't find your printer, you might be able to add it manually.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Connected devices** > **Printing**.
3. Tap the printer service for the printer that you want to use. If the printer service is turned off, turn it on.
4. Tap  > **Add printer**.
5. Follow the instructions on the screen.

## Printing using Google Cloud Print™

You can use Google Cloud Print™ to print from your device to a Cloud Ready printer or to any printer that's connected to a computer.

To print to a printer that's not Cloud Ready, you must also do the following:


- Make sure that Google Chrome™ is installed on your computer, and then log in to the same Google™ account that you use on your device.
- When you print, make sure that your computer is turned on.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen once using two fingers, or twice using one finger.
2. Tap .
3. Drag a setting icon to another position, and then release your finger.
4. Tap  > **Reset** to use the default quick settings.

# Notifications

## Manage your notifications

Notifications let you know about new messages, calendar events, app updates, and more. When you receive a notification, an indicator appears in the upper-left corner of the screen.

### Check and open your latest notifications

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen with one finger.
2. If necessary, pull down to see more notifications.
3. Tap a notification to open it.

### Block or prioritise a notification


1. Swipe down from the top of the screen with one finger.
2. Touch and hold a notification.
3. Tap one of **Show notifications silently**, **Block all notifications**, **Don't silence or block**.
4. Tap **Done**.


## Dismiss a notification

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen with one finger.
2. Swipe left or right on a notification.

**Note:** To dismiss all of your notifications at once, tap **Clear all**.

## Change the volume of your notifications

You can quickly access the volume sliders for ring, notifications, media, and alarms when you press the "Volume up/down key" and then tap . You can also customise the volume from the device settings screen.


1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Sound**.
3. Drag any of the sliders to the right or left.

## Change your notification sounds

**Note:** To change notification sounds and vibration settings for a specific app, look in the Settings screen inside the app. For example, if you want to turn off notification sounds for new emails, open BlackBerry Hub, open the Settings screen, and change the notification settings for your email account.

## Change the default notification sound

The default sound only applies to apps that are set to use the default.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Sound** > **Default notification sound**.
3. Tap a notification sound.
4. Tap **OK**.

To turn sounds on or off for features such as screen locking or the dial pad, turn any of the **Other sounds and vibrations** switches on or off.

## Add a custom notification sound


**Note:** If your device uses Android for Work, you can't select custom notification sounds for apps inside your work space.

1. Save the .mp3 file you want to use to the **Notifications** folder in your device's internal storage.
2. When you set the notification sound in an app's settings or change the default notification sound, tap the file name of your .mp3 file.
3. Tap **OK**.

# Turn off all sounds and notifications

Do not disturb lets you quickly silence your device when you don't want to be interrupted, like in a cinema or during an important meeting. You can also choose to receive only certain notifications, like calls or alarms.


## Turn on Do not disturb

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen once using two fingers, or twice using one finger.
2. Tap  **Do not disturb**.
3. Tap **Total silence**, **Alarms only**, or **Priority only**.
4. To change how long Do not disturb stays on, tap + or -, or tap **Until you turn this off**.
5. Tap **Done**.


**Tip:** You can quickly turn on Alarms only mode by pressing the **Volume down** key until the volume is all the way down, then pressing the key once more.

## Keep some sounds and notifications on

You can use priority only mode to receive the notifications that are most important to you while keeping everything else silent.


1. Swipe down from the top of the screen once using two fingers, or twice using one finger.
2. Tap  **Do not disturb** > **Priority only** > **More settings** > **Priority only allows**.
3. Choose the types of notifications you want to keep on.

## Turn off all sounds and notifications except calls

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen once using two fingers, or twice using one finger.
2. Tap  **Do not disturb** > **Priority only** > **More settings** > **Priority only allows**.
3. Turn off the **Reminders** and **Events** switches.
4. Tap **Messages** > **None**.
5. Tap **Calls** > **From anyone**.

## Automatically turn on Do not disturb at certain times

You can automatically turn on Do not disturb at regular times or during all events of a certain type in your calendar.


1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Sound** > **Do Not Disturb preferences**.
3. Tap one of the existing rules or add a new one.

4. If necessary, change the rule's settings.
5. If necessary, tap the switch at the top of the screen to turn on the rule.

## Customise notifications for an app

To change notification sounds and vibration settings for a specific app, look in the Settings screen inside the app. For example, if you want to turn off notification sounds for new emails, open BlackBerry Hub, open the Settings screen, and change the notification settings for your email account.

To change system-level notification settings for individual apps, follow the steps below.


1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Apps & notifications** > **Notification**.
3. To pulse the notifications light, tap **Blink light** > **On**.
4. Tap **Notifications** > an app.
5. Do one of the following:
  - To show a notification as a red dot on the app which has received a new notification, turn on the **Allow notification dot** switch.
  - To let the app make a sound, vibrate and/or show pop-up notifications on the screen, turn on the **Allow interruptions** switch.
  - To receive notifications from an app when Do Not Disturb is set to Priority Only, turn on the **Override Do Not Disturb** switch.

## Change how notifications are displayed on your lock screen

You can customise your settings so that only the notifications that you want to see show up on the screen when your device is locked.

**Note:** Settings that you choose for the lock screen override notification settings for individual apps.

For information about setting a screen lock, see [Set up or change a screen lock](#).

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Security & Location** > **Lock screen preferences** > **On the lock screen**.
3. Do one of the following:
  - To get all notifications on the lock screen, including the contents of incoming email messages and chats, tap **Show all notification content**.
  - To receive a notification, but keep the contents hidden (such as who sent an email or the title of the song you downloaded), tap **Hide sensitive notification content**. (To see this option, a screen lock option, such as a password, must be set.)
  - To prevent notifications from appearing on the lock screen, tap **Don't show notifications at all**.

# Add owner info to your lock screen

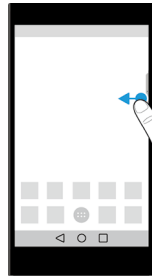
You can add your name, a personal message, or any other information that displays on your device when the screen is locked.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap **⚙️** > **Security & Location** > **Lock screen preferences** > **Lock screen message**.
3. Type your name or the message you want to display on the lock screen and tap **SAVE**.

# BlackBerry Productivity Tab

The BlackBerry Productivity Tab provides quick access to your upcoming events, new messages, tasks, contacts, and widgets. The tab is available on all device screens.

By default, the tab is turned on and is centred on the right edge of the device screen. If you want to turn off the tab, swipe down from the top of the screen. Tap **⚙️** > **Display**, and then turn off the **Productivity tab** switch.





## View productivity information and open apps

1. Swipe on the tab toward the centre of the screen.
2. Tap an app icon, such as Calendar or Contacts.
3. Do any of the following:
  - To see more details about an item, tap the notification.
  - To open the app associated with the notification, tap **More** or **Open**. You can return to the BlackBerry **Productivity Tab** screen from an app when you swipe on the tab again.
4. To close the tab, swipe toward the edge of the screen.

## Create an item using the BlackBerry Productivity Tab


You can add new items, such as calendar events, email messages or widgets, right from the BlackBerry Productivity Tab without opening your calendar or email apps.

1. Swipe on the tab toward the centre of the screen.
2. Tap an app icon.

3. Do one of the following:
  - To add an event, task, contact or widgets, tap .
  - To compose an email, tap .

## Customise the BlackBerry Productivity Tab settings

You can adjust the BlackBerry Productivity Tab to best suit your needs and find what works for you.




1. Swipe in on the tab toward the centre of the screen.
2. Tap , and then do any of the following:
  - To remove the tab from your screen, tap **Remove**. To turn on the tab, in Display settings, turn on the **Productivity tab** switch.
  - To change the placement of the tab to another side of your device screen, tap Left edge or Right edge.
  - To change the length of the tab, slide your finger left or right on the Height slider.
  - To adjust the transparency of the tab, slide your finger left or right on the Transparency slider.

**Tip:** By default, the tab is centred on the side of your screen, but you can move the tab up or down along the edge of the screen. Touch and hold the tab, and drag it to your preferred spot. Release your finger to place the tab.





3. If necessary, tap **Internal shared storage**.
4. Tap **Files**.
5. Tap .
6. Enter a search term, and then, on the keyboard, tap .




### Share, copy, or delete a file or folder



1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Storage**.
3. If necessary, tap **Internal shared storage**.
4. Tap **Files**.
5. Touch and hold a file or folder.

6. Do any of the following actions:
  - To share a file, tap , and then select how you want to share the file.
  - To copy a file or folder, tap  > **Copy to...**, and then select where you want to copy the file to. Tap **Copy**.
  - To delete a file or folder, tap .

**Tip:** To select multiple files or folders, touch and hold a file or folder, and then tap each additional file or folder. To select all of the files in a folder or all of the folders on a screen, touch and hold a file or folder, and then tap  > **Select all**.

## Sort your files or folders

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Storage**.
3. If necessary, tap **Internal shared storage**.
4. Tap **Files**.
5. Tap  or  to sort files or folders by name.

**Tip:** To change how your files and folders are displayed, tap  or .

## Using a media card

Get more space to store your ringtones, videos, pictures, songs, and more when you insert a microSD card into your device. By using a media card, you can expand your device's storage space by up to 2TB. Using a media card can also help increase the performance and power efficiency of your device, and can allow you to transfer your data from your current device to another device that supports media card transfers.

To use a media card with a capacity greater than 32GB, you must download Microsoft exFAT Technology for BlackBerry to install the driver. A notification appears when you insert the media card into your device. Make sure that you are connected to the Internet, and then tap the notification to download the driver.



A Class 10 card or faster is required to record videos in Ultra HD (4K).

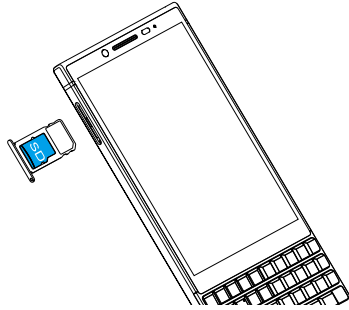
To help protect your privacy, you can format your media card to permanently delete all of the data. Depending on the amount of data, this process might take some time.

**CAUTION:** When you format your media card, you can't recover any of the deleted data.

1. Make sure that your device isn't connected to a computer.
2. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
3. Tap  > **Storage**.
4. Tap your media card.
5. Tap  > **Storage settings** > **Format**.

## Remove a media card

1. Do one of the following:
  - Turn off your device.
  - Swipe down from the top of the screen. Tap **⚙️ > Storage**. Tap your media card. Tap **⋮ > Storage settings > Eject**.
  - Swipe down from the top of the screen. Tap **⚙️ > Storage**. Tap **▲** to unmount the media card.
2. Release the tray by pushing the tip of the tool (provided in the box) into the hole on the right side of your device. If you don't have the tool that came with your device, you can also use a paper clip.



3. Pull out the tray completely and remove the media card.
4. Push the tray back into the slot.

## Check how much storage space is free


1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap **⚙️ > Storage**.
3. If necessary, tap **Internal shared storage**.
4. To see more details about an item in the list, tap the item. For example, to see which apps are using the most storage space, tap **Other apps**.

## Free up storage space

You may notice slower performance on your device if its internal storage space is full or almost full. You can try removing unnecessary files and clearing cached data to free up space and improve your device's performance.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap **⚙️ > Storage**.
3. If necessary, tap **Internal shared storage**.
4. Do any of the following:
  - To disable or uninstall an app that you don't use, tap an app. Tap **Disable** or **Uninstall**.



- To delete files that you don't need, tap a category or tap **Files**. Navigate to a file. Touch and hold the file. Tap any additional files that you want to delete. Tap  .
- To delete temporary files from your device by clearing your cache, tap **Cached data > OK**.

## Transfer files between your computer and device using a USB connection

1. Using a USB cable, connect your device to your computer.
2. On your device, swipe down from the top of the screen and tap the **System UI > Connected in charging mode > CHARGE & DATE**.
3. Tap **Transfer files** or **Transfer photos (PTP)**.
4. On your computer, if necessary, enter your device password. Your device and media card appear as drives on your computer.
5. Go to the files or folders that you want to copy.
6. Drag and drop the files or folders into the desired location on your computer.
7. If necessary, before disconnecting your device, right click your device's drive on your computer screen. Click **Eject**.

## Change how your device connects to your computer











Each time you connect your device to your computer, by default, your device connects in charging mode and a notification appears in the notification tray that tells you which mode is in use. To change the connection mode, your device must be connected to your computer.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap the **System UI > Connected in charging mode > CHARGE & DATE**.
3. Select an option.





# Connections

## Wireless connection icons

The following icons might appear at the top of your screen to indicate the wireless coverage level that your device currently has.


Icon	Description
	The amount of solid colour indicates the strength of the mobile signal. If the signal is weak, your device might use more power to try to maintain the connection.
	Your device is connected to the mobile network and can access all of the features of your mobile network plan.
	Your device is connected to the network type shown, but the network functionality is limited. You might be able to make a phone call, but you might not be able to access the Internet or view email messages.
	You have no mobile network coverage. You can only make emergency calls.
	Your device is roaming. Extra charges might apply.
	The amount of solid colour indicates the strength of the Wi-Fi signal. If the signal is weak, your device might use more power to maintain the connection.
	Your device is connected to a Wi-Fi network but there is no Internet connectivity. Your device will use the mobile network instead.
	Your device is connected to a VPN.
	Your device is in aeroplane mode and all of your wireless network connections are turned off. You can turn on Wi-Fi or Bluetooth technology, but not your connection to the mobile network.
	There is no SIM card in your device.

The following icons appear at the top of your screen if your device is connected or trying to connect to another device using mobile hotspot mode, Internet tethering, Bluetooth technology, a USB cable, or NFC.

Icon	Description
	Mobile hotspot mode is turned on.
	Bluetooth technology is turned on. If this icon is inside a box, your device is connected to another device using Bluetooth tethering.
	Your device is connected to another device using a USB cable. If this icon is inside a box, your device is connected to another device using USB tethering.
	NFC is turned on.

# Turn on aeroplane mode

When you turn on aeroplane mode, all of the connections on your device turn off.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Network & Internet**.
3. Turn on the **Aeroplane mode** switch.

After you turn on aeroplane mode, you can turn on certain connections, such as Wi-Fi or Bluetooth technology. This feature allows you to connect to a Wi-Fi network on an aeroplane, for example.

## Mobile network


A mobile network connection allows your device to make calls and, if you have a data plan, use data services such as Internet browsing.

If your device is set up for roaming and you travel outside of your service provider's wireless coverage area, in most cases, your device connects to another service provider's wireless network automatically. If you're not sure whether your device is set up for roaming, or what roaming fees apply, check with your service provider before you travel.

## Connect to the mobile network


To connect to the mobile network, aeroplane mode must be turned off.

Your device is designed to connect automatically to your service provider's mobile network after you insert your SIM card into your device. If your device doesn't connect automatically, you can manually select the mobile network.

1. Insert your SIM card into your device.
2. If necessary, Swipe down from the top of the screen.
3. Tap  > **Network & Internet** > **Mobile networks** > **Network**.
4. Tap a network.

To turn off your mobile network connection, turn on aeroplane mode.

## Set a preferred network type

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Network & Internet** > **Mobile networks** > **Preferred network type**.
3. Tap the type of network you prefer.

## Switch mobile networks manually

If you can't connect to a mobile network or if the network signal is weak, you can try switching networks manually.


1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.

2. Tap  > **Network & Internet** > **Mobile networks** > **Network**.
3. Tap a network.

## Turn off data services over the mobile network

To turn off data services, you must have a SIM card in your device.


If you turn off data services, your device can't send or receive data over the mobile network and many features and apps might not work correctly.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Network & Internet** > **Data usage**.
3. Turn off the **Mobile data** switch.

To turn on data services, turn on the **Mobile data** switch.

## Turn off data services while roaming



Depending on your wireless service plan, you might be able to turn off data services (email messages, PIN messages, text messages with attachments, and browser service) on your device so that only the phone and basic text messaging are available. Turning off data services while roaming might prevent you from receiving additional roaming charges. For more information, contact your service provider.


1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Network & Internet** > **Mobile networks**.
3. Tap **Data services while roaming**.
4. Do one of the following:
  - To turn off data services, tap **Off**.
  - To receive a prompt before using data services while roaming, tap **Prompt**.

To turn on data services while roaming, tap **On**.

## Change the APN settings for your default Internet connection

Your device uses Access Point Name (APN) settings to open a data connection with your service provider's wireless network. You might need to change your APN settings if you change your wireless service plan or if the default settings don't apply to your service provider. Depending on your service provider, you might not be able to change the APN settings.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Network & Internet** > **Mobile networks** > **Access Point Names**.
3. Do one of the following:
  - To create a new APN, tap .
  - To change an existing APN, tap an APN.
4. Complete the fields. If you don't have the required information, contact your service provider.



5. Tap  > **Save**.

To reset the default APN settings, tap  > **Reset to default**.

## Change your wireless service plan

To change your wireless service plan, you must have a SIM card in your device.


Depending on your service provider, you might not be able to change the details of your wireless service plan from your device.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Network & Internet** > **Data usage** > **Mobile data usage**. > .
3. Turn on the **Set data limit** checkbox.
4. Tap **Data limit**, then enter data to set.

## Troubleshooting: Mobile network

### I can't connect to the mobile network

Try the following:

- Check that aeroplane mode is turned off. Swipe down from the top of the screen. Tap  > **Network & Internet**. Check that the **Aeroplane mode** switch is turned off.
- Try switching to another mobile network. Please see [Switch mobile networks manually](#).
- Check that the SIM card is inserted correctly in your device. Please see [Insert the SIM card](#).


## Wi-Fi network


A Wi-Fi network connection allows your device to use data services, but unlike using the mobile network, using Wi-Fi doesn't add charges to your data plan.

When you connect to a Wi-Fi network, your device saves the network information. The next time your device is within range of the saved Wi-Fi network, and Wi-Fi is turned on, your device can connect to the network automatically.

Your device can be connected to the mobile network and a Wi-Fi network at the same time. For basic data functions, such as using the Internet or downloading apps, your device is designed to try to use a saved Wi-Fi network before it tries to use the mobile network. Keep in mind that if you leave Wi-Fi turned on, your battery might lose power more quickly.


### Connect to a Wi-Fi network

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Network & Internet** > **Wi-Fi**.
3. Turn on the switch.
4. Tap a network.

5. If necessary, do one of the following:
  - Enter the password for the Wi-Fi network, and then tap **Connect**.
  - To connect to a Wi-Fi network at work, enter your username and password, and then tap **Connect**.
  - To connect to a public network, tap the sign-in notification and, if necessary, accept the licence agreement. If necessary, tap  > **Use this network as is**.


## Add a Wi-Fi network manually

If your device doesn't connect automatically to a saved Wi-Fi network, you can set up a connection to a Wi-Fi network manually. If you don't have the required information, ask your network administrator or the person who manages the Wi-Fi network.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Network & Internet** > **Wi-Fi**.
3. Turn on the switch.
4. Tap **Add network**.
5. In the **Network name** field, type the SSID for the network.
6. In the **Security** drop-down list, tap the network's security type.
7. If necessary, tap **Advanced options** and specify additional information.
8. Tap **Save**.


## Connect to a Wi-Fi network using a proxy

You can connect to any Wi-Fi network using a proxy. You must be within range of the Wi-Fi network to change the proxy settings.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Network & Internet** > **Wi-Fi**.
3. Turn on the switch.
4. Touch and hold a network.
5. Tap **Modify network**.
6. Tap **Advanced options**. You might need to slide your finger up to see this option.
7. In the **Proxy** drop-down list, do one of the following:
  - To set up a proxy, tap **Manual**, and then enter the proxy settings.
  - To use a proxy already set up for the network, tap **Proxy Auto-Config**, and then confirm the proxy settings.
8. Tap **Save**.

## Delete a saved Wi-Fi network


If you don't want your device to connect to a Wi-Fi network automatically, you can delete the information used to connect to the network.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Network & Internet** > **Wi-Fi**.
3. Turn on the switch.
4. Tap a network, and then tap **Forget**.

## Set a static IP address for a Wi-Fi connection


You must be within range of your Wi-Fi network to change the IP settings.

By default, when you connect your device to a Wi-Fi network, your device assigns an IP address to the connection. You can set a static IP address that doesn't change each time you connect to a Wi-Fi network.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Network & Internet** > **Wi-Fi**.
3. Turn on the switch.
4. Touch and hold a network.
5. Tap **Modify network**.
6. Tap **Advanced options**. You might need to slide your finger up to see this option.
7. In the **IP settings** drop-down list, tap **Static**.
8. Change the IP address fields.
9. Tap **Save**.

## Change advanced settings for your Wi-Fi connections

You can change advanced settings for your Wi-Fi connections. For example, you can set whether your Wi-Fi connection remains active when your device sleeps and you can change the Wi-Fi frequency band. You can also find the Media Access Control (MAC) address and IP address for your device.


1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Network & Internet** > **Wi-Fi**.
3. If necessary, turn on the switch.
4. Tap **Wi-Fi preferences**.

## Advanced Wi-Fi connection settings

Setting	Description
Network notification	Turn on this switch to receive a notification when your device is within range of a public Wi-Fi network.
Install certificates	Tap this option to install digital certificates that can identify your device when, for example, your device connects to VPN or a Wi-Fi network.
Wi-Fi Direct	Tap this option to connect with available Wi-Fi Direct compatible devices.
WPS Pin Entry	Tap this option to enter the PIN for the Wi-Fi Protected Setup feature.

## Review saved networks



Tap to set the frequency band. When you set the band to 5 GHz, your device connects to access points on the 5-GHz band only. When set to 2.4 GHz, your device connects to access points on the 2.4-GHz band only. When set to automatic, your device tries to connect to the band with the stronger signal strength.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Network & Internet** > **Wi-Fi**.
3. If necessary, turn on the switch.
4. Tap **Saved networks**.

## Troubleshooting: Wi-Fi connections


### I can't connect to a Wi-Fi network

Start by checking the following:

- Verify that Wi-Fi is turned on. Swipe down from the top of the screen. Tap  > **Network & Internet** > **Wi-Fi**. Check that the switch is turned on.
- Try turning aeroplane mode on and off. Please see [Turn on aeroplane mode](#).
- Check that your password for the Wi-Fi network is correct.
- Turn off your device, and then turn it on again.
- Delete the information used to connect to the Wi-Fi network, and then try to connect again. Please see [Delete a saved Wi-Fi network](#).
- Verify that mobile hotspot mode is turned off. If mobile hotspot mode is on, your device can't connect to a Wi-Fi network. Swipe down from the top of the screen. Tap  > **Network & Internet** > **Tethering & Mobile Hotspot**. Check that the **Mobile Hotspot** switch is turned off.
- Unplug your modem or router for 15 seconds, and then plug it in again.
- Try connecting your device to another Wi-Fi network at another location. If you can connect to another Wi-Fi network, the problem might be specific to the Wi-Fi network at the original location.



Try more advanced troubleshooting options:

- Try choosing a different authentication type. Swipe down from the top of the screen. Tap  > **Network & Internet** > **Wi-Fi**. Touch and hold the Wi-Fi network, and then tap **Modify network**.
- Check that the time on your device is correct and synchronised with the network time. If the times are different, it could prevent your device from connecting (for example, connecting to a network might require that you have a certificate on your device, and the certificate has an expiration date).
- If you use your device for work, your organisation might prevent connections to certain wireless access points. For more information, contact your administrator.

If you still can't connect, contact your Internet service provider.


## Bluetooth technology

Bluetooth wireless technology allows you to create a direct connection between your device and another Bluetooth enabled device. For example, you can use a Bluetooth connection to play music through a separate speaker, make calls on a headset, share files, or connect to Android Wear™ or a car kit.

Before you can connect to a Bluetooth enabled device, you must turn on Bluetooth technology on your device and then pair the two devices. Some paired devices, for example, a car kit, usually connect to your device automatically.

### Turn on Bluetooth technology


If you turn on Bluetooth technology, your device is discoverable and visible to other Bluetooth enabled devices nearby.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Connected devices** > **Bluetooth**.
3. Turn on the switch.

To turn off Bluetooth technology, turn off the switch.


### Pair and connect your device with a Bluetooth enabled device

Make sure that you turn on Bluetooth technology on the device that you want to connect to.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Connected devices** > **Bluetooth**.
3. To pair the devices, in the **Available devices** list, tap the device name, and complete the instructions on the screen. If you're prompted to enter a pairing code, try entering 0000 or 1234, or check the documentation that came with the device.
4. To connect the devices, in the **Paired devices** list, tap the device name. Your devices are ready to communicate over the Bluetooth connection.



## Change the name of your device for Bluetooth connections

If you turn on Bluetooth technology, the name of your device is visible to other Bluetooth enabled devices nearby.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Connected devices** > **Bluetooth**.
3. Tap **Device name**.
4. Enter a new name for your device.
5. Tap **Rename**.



## Change the settings for a paired Bluetooth enabled device

Some Bluetooth enabled devices support more than one Bluetooth feature. You can turn a feature on or off for a paired Bluetooth enabled device. You can also change the name of a paired device as it appears on your device.


1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Connected devices** > **Bluetooth**.
3. Tap  beside the device you want to change.
4. Make your changes.
5. Tap **OK**.

## Delete a paired Bluetooth enabled device

If you no longer want to connect to a Bluetooth enabled device, you can delete the device from the list of paired devices.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Connected devices** > **Bluetooth**.
3. Tap  beside the device you want to disconnect.
4. Tap **FORGET**.

## View a list of files you received over Bluetooth

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Connected devices** > **Bluetooth**.
3. Tap **Show received files**.

## Supported Bluetooth profiles

Your device is a Bluetooth Smart Ready device, and supports the following profiles:

Profile	Description
Advanced Audio Distribution Profile (A2DP)	This profile allows your device to stream audio files to Bluetooth enabled devices that support stereo audio, such as stereo headsets, speakers, and car kits.
Audio/Video Remote Control Profile (AVRCP)	This profile allows you to use the buttons on a Bluetooth enabled device, such as a headset, to perform actions such as adjusting the volume or playing the next or previous media file on your device. This profile also displays information about songs on a Bluetooth enabled device.
Device Identification Profile (DID)	This profile allows Bluetooth enabled devices to access information about your device model in order to support plug and play features, such as automatically downloading the required drivers.
Hands-Free Profile (HFP)	This profile allows you to connect your device to Bluetooth enabled headsets and car kits in order to make hands-free calls. This profile supports wideband audio.
Headset Profile (HSP)	This profile allows you to connect your device to a Bluetooth enabled headset.
Human Interface Device Profile (HID)	This profile allows you to connect your device to a Bluetooth enabled device, such as a keyboard or mouse.
Human Interface Device over Gatt Profile (HOGP)	This profile allows you to connect your device to a Bluetooth Smart device, such as a keyboard or mouse.
Message Access Profile (MAP)	This profile allows a car kit to access text messages (SMS and MMS) on your device and lets you browse and read the text messages. If supported by the car kit, you can also delete, compose, and send text messages from your car.
Object Push Profile (OPP)	This profile allows your device to send files to and receive files from a Bluetooth enabled device.
Personal Area Network Profile (PAN)	This profile allows you to use your device to share your network connection when connected to a Bluetooth enabled computer. This profile also lets you connect your device to another device that is sharing its network connection.
Phone Book Access Profile (PBAP)	This profile allows a Bluetooth enabled car kit to access contact information and recent call history information on your device. This profile allows the car kit to display the contact name for an incoming call.
Serial Port Profile (SPP)	This profile allows you to connect your device to other Bluetooth enabled devices that support the Serial Port Profile for data transfer.
Remote SIM Access Profile (rSAP)	This profile allows a Bluetooth enabled device, such as a car kit, to access the SIM card on your device.

## Troubleshooting: Bluetooth connections

### I can't pair my device with a Bluetooth enabled device

- Check that your device and the device that you want to connect to have Bluetooth technology turned on.
- To scan again for nearby Bluetooth enabled devices, on the **Bluetooth** screen, tap **Pair new device**.
- If your Bluetooth enabled device requires a passkey and you don't know what the passkey is, try 0000 or 1234, or check the documentation that came with your Bluetooth enabled device.
- If the Bluetooth enabled device uses a battery, connect the device to a power source and then try again. If the battery power level is too low, the device might be unable to pair with another device.
- Check that your device is compatible with the Bluetooth enabled device. For more information, see the documentation that came with the Bluetooth enabled device.
- If mobile hotspot mode is turned on, verify that the device that you want to connect to uses the Hands-Free, Serial Port, or Personal Area Network profile.

### I keep losing the connection with my Bluetooth enabled car kit

- Check that your car kit is using the latest software version. For more information about your car kit's software version, see the documentation that came with your car kit.
- Move your device to another location in your vehicle or turn your device to face another direction. The location of your device's antenna in relation to your car kit's Bluetooth antenna may affect the Bluetooth connection.

## NFC

NFC is a short-range wireless technology that you can use to share content and information with another NFC-enabled device or an NFC tag. Some NFC apps are designed to simulate a physical card, such as a credit card, a public transit pass, or an access badge. With NFC, you don't enter any information to create a connection, making NFC useful for on-the-go actions.

If an app supports NFC, you might be able to:

- Share a picture with a friend.
- Unlock your device using the Smart Lock feature.
- Grab a coupon from a poster.
- Send a webpage to a friend.
- Exchange contact cards with a business acquaintance.

## Share content using NFC

To share content with another device, make sure that both devices are unlocked and support NFC.

Not all apps support NFC.

1. On your device, open a screen that shows what you want to share, such as a webpage, YouTube video, or contact.

2. Tap the back of your device against the back of another NFC-enabled device or an NFC tag.
3. To send a file, if necessary, touch your device screen.  
When the devices connect, you might hear a sound or your device might vibrate.

**Tip:** If you can't share content, try using the Android™ Beam feature. Open a screen that shows what you want to share. Tap **⋮ > Share > Android Beam**. Complete the instructions on the screen.

## Change the NFC settings

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap **⚙️ > Connected devices > NFC**.
3. If necessary, turn on the **Turn on NFC** switch.
4. Do any of the following:
  - To receive a prompt to accept file transfers, turn on the **Prompt before receiving** switch.
  - To turn off the Android™ Beam feature, turn off the **Turn on Android Beam** switch.

To turn off NFC, turn off the **Turn on NFC** switch.

# Tethering and mobile hotspot mode

## Internet tethering

Internet tethering allows another device, such as a laptop or tablet, to share your device's connection to the mobile network. You can connect the other device to your BlackBerry device using a USB cable or, if both devices are Bluetooth enabled, you can use Bluetooth technology instead.

Additional charges might apply for using Internet tethering.

## Mobile hotspot

When you use the mobile hotspot feature, your device becomes a wireless access point for other Wi-Fi enabled devices to connect to and access the Internet. For the best performance, plug your device into a battery charger and connect it to a power source.

Since the mobile hotspot feature uses the mobile network, you might incur additional data charges.

## Use Internet tethering to share your mobile network connection

If your device has a data plan, you can share its Internet connection with another device, such as a laptop or tablet. You can tether your devices using an appropriate cable or a Bluetooth connection.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap **⚙️ > Network & Internet > Tethering & Mobile Hotspot**.


3. Do one of the following:
  - Connect your device to another device using an appropriate cable, and then turn on the **USB tethering** switch.
  - Turn on the **Bluetooth tethering** switch, and then connect your device to another device using Bluetooth technology.

To stop sharing your Internet connection, turn off the **USB tethering** or **Bluetooth tethering** switch.

## Use mobile hotspot to share your Internet connection

Before you turn on Mobile hotspot, confirm that your device is connected to the mobile network.


When you set up your mobile hotspot, record its name and password. You, or the user of another device that wants to connect to your mobile hotspot, must know this name and password to connect.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Network & Internet** > **Tethering & Mobile Hotspot**.
3. Turn on the **Mobile Hotspot** switch.
4. To change your settings, tap **Set up Mobile Hotspot**. Make your changes, and then tap **SAVE**.

To stop sharing your Internet connection, turn off the **Mobile Hotspot** switch.



## View a list of devices that are connected to your mobile hotspot

Make sure that Mobile hotspot is turned on.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Network & Internet** > **Tethering & Mobile Hotspot** > **Connected devices**.

## Troubleshooting: Tethering and mobile hotspot

### I can't use Internet tethering


- Check that your device is connected to the mobile network.
- Check that data services are turned on. Swipe down from the top of the screen. Tap  > **Network & Internet** > **Data usage**. Confirm that the **Mobile data** switch is turned on.
- Check that your wireless service plan is set up to use Internet tethering.
- If your wireless service plan supports Internet tethering while roaming, check that data roaming is turned on. Swipe down from the top of the screen. Tap  > **Network & Internet** > **Mobile networks**. Confirm that the **Data services while roaming** setting is set to **Prompt** or **On**.
- If you use your device for work, your organisation might not allow Internet tethering. For more information, check with your administrator.

### I can't use my device as a mobile hotspot

- Check that you're connected to the mobile network.
- Check that your wireless service plan is set up to use the mobile hotspot feature. If not, you must change your wireless service plan before Mobile hotspot can work on your device.

- Your service provider might not allow the use of the Mobile hotspot feature while roaming. For more information, check your wireless service plan or contact your service provider.
- If you're using your device for work, your organisation might not allow the use of the Mobile hotspot feature. For more information, check with your administrator.

## I can't find the mobile hotspot password

- If you set up a mobile hotspot, you must enter its password on the device that is trying to connect to your mobile hotspot.
- To find your password, on your BlackBerry device, swipe down from the top of the screen. Tap  > **Network & Internet** > **Tethering & Mobile Hotspot**, and then tap **Set up Mobile Hotspot**. Tap the **Show password** checkbox.



## VPN

A connection to a virtual private network (VPN) allows your device to use a wireless network connection to send data to and receive data from a private network. For example, a VPN connection allows your device to connect securely to your organisation's network when you are working outside the office. When you connect to a VPN, the security and data management policies for the private network protect your data.

Before you can connect to a VPN, you must add a VPN profile. Only the device owner can add and manage VPN profiles on your device. You might also need to install a VPN app on your device. For more information, contact your administrator or download a VPN app from the Google Play™ store.


## Add a VPN profile

Before you can add a VPN profile, you must set a screen lock for your device.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Network & Internet** > **VPN** > .
3. Complete the fields on the screen. If you don't know the network information, contact your administrator.
4. Tap **SAVE**.

## Connect to a VPN



You must add a virtual private network (VPN) profile to your device before you can connect to a VPN.


1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Network & Internet** > **VPN**.
3. Tap a VPN profile.
4. Enter your login information, and then tap the **Save account information** checkbox to connect automatically next time.
5. Tap **CONNECT**.

To disconnect from a VPN, on the **VPN** screen, tap the VPN profile you are connected to. Tap **DISCONNECT**.



## Connect to a VPN automatically

To connect to a VPN automatically, the VPN must support always-on mode.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Network & Internet** > **VPN**.
3. Tap  > **Always-on VPN**.
4. Complete the instructions on the screen.

To turn off always-on mode, on the **VPN** screen, tap  > **Always-on VPN** > **None** > **OK**.

## Change or delete a VPN profile


1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Network & Internet** > **VPN**.
3. Tap  beside the VPN profile you want to change or delete.
4. Do one of the following:
  - Change the information, and then tap **SAVE**.
  - Tap **FORGET**.

## Emergency broadcast messages

Depending on your region, service provider, and wireless network, you might receive text messages (SMS or MMS) about possible threats to safety in your area. For example, you might receive messages with information about severe weather, a missing child, or a national emergency. For more information, contact your service provider or administrator.

## Change the settings for emergency broadcast messages

Depending on your region, some settings might not be available.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Sound** > **Emergency broadcasts**.
3. Do any of the following:
  - To receive a reminder for emergency broadcast messages, tap **Alert reminder**, and then tap how often you want to receive a reminder.
  - To stop your device from vibrating when you receive an emergency broadcast message, unmark the **Vibrate** checkbox.
  - To stop receiving emergency broadcast messages, unmark the **Show extreme threats**, **Show severe threats**, and **Show AMBER alerts** checkboxes.




# Data usage

Data usage refers to the amount of data that your device uploads and downloads when it is connected to the wireless network. If you share your device with others, you can monitor the amount of data used by the device owner, guest, and any user profiles on the device. Only the device owner can change the data usage settings.

If you exceed the data limit of your plan, your service provider might charge you additional fees. For more information about your data limit, check your wireless service plan.

## Monitor your wireless data usage


You can check how much data you use by wireless network type, time period, app, or in total.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Network & Internet** > **Data usage**.
3. To see your Wi-Fi usage, tap **Wi-Fi data usage**.
4. Do any of the following:
  - To check how much data you used during the current data usage cycle, view the value beside the time period.
  - To check how much data an app used, view the value beside the app name.
  - To check how much data each user profile set up on the device used, tap a user profile.
  - To check how much data you used during a time period other than the current one, tap ▼ tap a date.

**Tip:** You can close some apps to help reduce your data usage.


## Change when you get notified about data usage

Your wireless service plan must include data services.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Network & Internet** > **Data usage**.
3. If necessary, turn on the **Mobile data** switch.
4. To see your mobile data usage, tap **Mobile data usage**.

## Set a limit for data usage


You can set a limit on the amount of data that your device can use when it's connected to the mobile network. If your device reaches that limit, it can turn off data services and send you a notification. When data services are turned off, apps and services on your device might not work correctly.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Network & Internet** > **Data usage**.
3. If necessary, turn on the **Mobile data** switch.

4. Turn **Billing cycle** > **Set data limit** switch, and then tap **OK**.
5. Tap **Data limit**, enter the limit number, and then tap **SET**.


## Stop sending background data over the mobile network

To reduce the amount of data that your device uses when connected to the mobile network, you can stop apps and services from sending data when you aren't actively using the app or service. If you restrict background data, apps and services might not work correctly unless your device connects to a Wi-Fi network.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Network & Internet** > **Data usage**.
3. Tap **Data saver**, and then turn on the switch.

## Stop sending data on some Wi-Fi networks

You can stop apps and services from sending data in the background, and prevent your device from downloading large files when it's connected to certain Wi-Fi networks.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Network & Internet** > **Data usage** > **Network restrictions**.
3. Tap a network name.

## Troubleshooting: Device temperature

Some of the following usage examples may raise the device temperature:


- Continuous wireless data transfer, such as application upgrade through Wi-Fi, tethering and mobile hotspot mode;
- Prolonged calls, game playing, and Internet surfing or running other complex applications.

This rise in temperature is a normal consequence of the CPU handling excessive data. Ending any of the above actions will make your phone return to its normal temperature.

# Battery and power

## Check your battery power level and usage info

You can see which apps and features are using the most battery power and how much battery power you have left.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Battery**.

# Charge your device

**CAUTION:** Use the charging accessory that came with your device, or a charger specifically approved by BlackBerry for use with your device. Other chargers might not provide adequate power and might damage your device.

1. Insert the cable into the port on your device.
2. Plug the charger into a power outlet.







## Keeping your battery charged

Your device uses a lithium-ion battery. To maximise your use of this type of battery, when possible, do the following:

- Avoid using your device while it's charging to help it charge faster.
- Do not leave your device plugged into a charger after it has reached a full charge.
- Avoid charging, using, or storing your device in extremely hot or cold places, such as on a vehicle dashboard.
- Avoid leaving your device turned off for extended periods when the battery power level is low. If you plan to store your device for an extended period, partially charge the battery and put the device in a cool, dry place.

## Battery and charging icons

The battery power level icons appear at the top of the screen.

Icon	Description
	The battery is charging.
	The battery is fully charged and still connected to a power source.
	The battery is getting low on power.
	Battery saver mode is turned on, or you can turn it on from your list of notifications.
	The battery is at 5% power or less. If the battery charge gets too low, your device might turn off. Save any work in progress and charge your device.
	There is a problem with the battery, and the battery might need to be replaced.


# About the battery edge indicator

When turned on, the battery edge indicator appears as a strip of colour on the right edge of the screen. The strip grows and transitions from red to yellow to green as your device charges.

When your device is charging, the indicator displays the percentage of your current battery power.


To avoid disturbing you, the indicator automatically disappears when the room is dark or when your battery power level reaches 100%. If your screen is turned on, the indicator automatically disappears after eight seconds.

## Turn off the battery edge indicator

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Display**.
3. Tap **Show battery status on screen edge**, and then select the **Off** option.

# How can I extend battery life?

To save battery power, your device automatically goes to sleep when you aren't using it, and apps that you don't use regularly are put in standby mode.

If your battery is still draining quicker than expected, you can change some device settings to extend battery life. Swipe down from the top of the screen. Tap , and then change any of the following settings:

## Turn off network connections that you aren't using

When your device is outside a wireless coverage area, you can turn off your mobile network or Wi-Fi connections so that your device doesn't search for a wireless network signal continuously.

In the device's settings, do any of the following:

- To turn off all connections, tap **Network & Internet**. Turn on the **Aeroplane mode** switch.
- To turn off Wi-Fi only, tap **Network & Internet**, turn off the Wi-Fi switch.

## Delete saved Wi-Fi networks

1. In the device's settings, tap **Network & Internet** > **Wi-Fi**.
2. Tap a Wi-Fi network, and then tap **FORGET**.

## Shorten the length of time before your device goes to sleep

1. In the device's settings, tap **Display**.
2. Tap **Sleep**, and then tap 15 seconds or 30 seconds.

## Dim the screen

1. In the device's settings, tap **Display > Brightness level**.
2. On the slider, drag the slider handle to the left.

## Turn down the volume

1. In the device's settings, tap **Sound**.
2. On the **Media volume**, **Alarm volume**, **Ring volume**, or **Notification volume** sliders, drag the slider handle to the left.

## Turn off key press feedback

1. In the device's settings, tap **System > Languages & input > Keyboard settings > BlackBerry Keyboard > Key press feedback**.
2. Turn off the **Vibrate** switch and the **Sound** switch.

## Turn on battery saver

If your device is low on battery power, you can turn on Battery saver to limit features that use the most power, such as vibration, location services, and data services. You can set Battery saver to turn on automatically when your battery power reaches a certain percentage.

**Note:** When Battery saver is turned on, some applications and messaging services that rely on syncing might not update unless you open them.

1. In the device settings, tap **Battery > Battery saver**.
2. Turn on the switch.
3. To turn on Battery saver automatically when your device is low on battery power, tap **Turn on automatically**. Tap a percentage.

## Turn on battery optimisation

By default, Battery optimisation is turned on for most apps and features. If you turned off Battery optimisation for an app, you might want to turn it back on again, at least until you have a chance to charge your device.

1. In the device settings, tap **Battery > ⋮ > Battery optimisation**.
2. Tap ▼ > **All apps**.
3. Tap an app.
4. Select the **Optimise** option, and then tap **DONE**.

# Device and battery safety

You should use only the battery that BlackBerry specifies for use with your particular BlackBerry device model. If you use any other battery, you might invalidate any warranty provided with your device.

**CAUTION:** There is a risk of explosion if the battery is replaced with an incorrect battery type. Do not try to replace your nonremovable battery. Only qualified service personnel should perform repairs or battery replacements in your device.


## Device and battery disposal

Please recycle your device and battery in accordance with your local regulations. Do not dispose of either your device or battery in a fire. Your device or battery should not be placed in household waste bins.

## View the safety, warranty, and privacy information for your device

Take a moment to review the licence agreement, limited warranty, safety information, and privacy policies for your device. These documents are available from your device settings screen. They contain important information about terms and conditions of use, the battery, other important safety precautions, and warranty coverage.


To view BlackBerry's Privacy Policy, your device must be connected to the Internet.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **System** > **About phone** > **Legal information** > **BlackBerry**.

# Display

## Change your wallpaper

Add your favourite photo to the home screen of your device.

1. In the Photos app, tap a picture.
2. Tap  > **Use as** > **Wallpaper**.
3. Slide your fingers apart or together to zoom in or zoom out.
4. Tap **Set wallpaper**.




**Tip:** To change your wallpaper, touch and hold a blank area on a home screen, tap **WALLPAPER**. To use a picture as your wallpaper, tap **Select image** and tap a picture.

## Take a screenshot


Press and hold the **Volume down** key and the **Power on/off** key at the same time.

Screenshots are saved in the **Photos** > **Screenshots** folder.

## Change the screen brightness



1. Swipe down from the top of the screen once using two fingers, or twice using one finger.
2. Drag  to the left or right. Or
3. Tap  > **Display** > **Brightness level**, then drag  to the left or right.

## Change your font size

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Display** > **Font size**.
3. Tap the text size that you want to use.



## Change your display language

The language that you selected during the initial setup of your device is your display language. The home screen, BlackBerry Hub, and supported applications display content in this language.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **System** > **Languages & input** > **Language**.
3. Tap **Add a language** to select a preferred language.
4. Tap  and swipe up to the top of the list.

## Turn on or turn off screen rotation


Choose whether or not your screen rotates when you turn your device.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen once using two fingers, or twice using one finger.
2. Tap  or .

**Note:** If you don't see the rotation icons, tap  > **Accessibility** and turn on the **Auto-rotate screen** switch.


## Set the wait time for sleep mode

Set the length of time that your device remains inactive before entering sleep mode.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Display** > **Sleep**.
3. Tap a time.

## Double tap to wake

If this feature is turned on, you can tap the screen twice to wake up your device, or tap an empty area on the home screen twice to turn off the screen.



1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Display**.
3. To turn this feature on or off, tap the **Tap to wake** switch.


## Cast your screen


Using Chromecast™ or a Wi-Fi CERTIFIED Miracast device, you can display your device's screen on your TV. With Chromecast™, you can also display content like TV shows, movies, photos, games, and websites from supported apps.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Connected devices** > **Cast**.
3. If necessary, tap  and select the **Enable wireless display** checkbox.
4. Tap the device that you want to share your screen with.

**Tip:** After you set up devices that you want to share your screen with, you can access them in the Quick Settings menu by tapping .


To stop casting your screen, swipe down from the top of the screen once with two fingers or twice with one finger. Tap , then tap the device you're casting to and tap **Disconnect**.

## Extended Display

Use USB Type-C Display Hub or USB Type-C - HDMI cable to connect with another bigger display device. You can play videos or share your screen.




## Wallpaper Shuffle

Wallpaper shuffle is a new interface to add to the lock screen. It's a new lock screen layout design with a new range of extended wallpapers.



1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Display** > **Wallpaper Shuffle**.
3. Turn on **On/Off** switch.
4. Tap **Categories**, then mark one or more pictures as wallpapers to the lock screen.



On the lock screen, tap  to do the following:

1. Tap  to add the current wallpaper to Favourites. It will appear more often on your lock screen.
2. Tap  to keep the current wallpaper pinned.
3. Tap  to stop the current wallpaper instantly if dislike it.


## Use your device as a flashlight

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen once using two fingers, or twice using one finger.
2. Tap .
3. To turn off the flashlight, tap .

## Convenience key

### Customise the Convenience key



Your device can perform up to 3 specific actions when you press the Convenience key (the short key on the right side of your device). For example, you can speed dial one of your favourite contacts, open an app, or turn on the flashlight etc.

1. To assign an action to the key, swipe down from the top of the screen, tap  > **Shortcuts & gestures** > **Convenience key**.
2. Tap **Add new shortcut**, then assign an action. After you've assigned the shortcuts, press the **Convenience** key to display up to 3 shortcuts.
3. To remove the shortcuts, tap an action then tap **CLEAR**.

### Advanced profiles for the Convenience key

#### Car profile

Press the convenience key to display the following shortcuts automatically when connected to special Bluetooth.

1. Tap **Car profile**.
2. Turn on the Car profile switch.
3. Tap  to the right of **Set car Bluetooth**.
4. Tap  to add Bluetooth connections.



## Meeting profile

Press the convenience key to display the following shortcuts automatically during meeting events.

1. Tap **Meeting profile**.
2. Turn on the Meeting profile switch.

## Home profile

Press the convenience key to display the following shortcuts automatically when connected to a particular Wi-Fi network.


1. Tap **Home profile**.
2. Turn on the Home profile switch.
3. Tap  to the right of **Set home Wi-Fi network**.
4. Tap  to add home Wi-Fi connections.



# Accounts

## Manage your accounts


### Add an account

You can add an account, such as a Microsoft Exchange or Yahoo! email account, to your device.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Users & accounts** > **Add account**.
3. Tap the type of account that you want to add.
4. Complete the instructions on the screen.


If you've added an email account to your device, you can send and respond to messages using the BlackBerry Hub. To add an email account to the BlackBerry Hub, in the BlackBerry Hub, tap , then click on the  symbol to the right of 'Accounts'. Complete the instructions on the screen.

### Change the settings for an account

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Users & accounts**.
3. Tap the type of account, and if necessary, tap the account.
4. Make your changes.

**Note:** To stop syncing information for all accounts (for example, to save battery life), on the Users & accounts screen, turn off the **Automatically sync data** switch.

## Delete an account

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Users & accounts**.
3. Tap the type of account that you want to delete, and if necessary, tap the account.
4. Tap **REMOVE ACCOUNT**.

# Accessibility

## About accessibility features on your device

Your device comes with several well-established accessibility aids for people with disabilities.


For more information on the following features, visit [Android Accessibility Help](#).

- Magnification settings allow you to zoom in or zoom out to increase or decrease the display magnification.
- Google™ TalkBack provides audible output based on the visual information displayed on your screen.
- Switch Access allows you to navigate screens on your device using external switches.
- Braille support is available using BrailleBack.
- Font size allows you to choose small, medium, large, or huge sizes.
- Screen Reader technology lets you select the text-to-speech application that you prefer to use (if you have downloaded an alternate text-to-speech engine on Google Play™).
- Google Now™ voice assistant answers questions, makes recommendations, and performs actions.
- Voice dictation allows you to dictate text instead of typing.
- Closed or open captioned multimedia content is available. Personalise your closed caption settings by adjusting character size, colour, opacity, or font.
- Display features, such as colour inversion and colour correction, are applied across all applications.
- The touch & hold delay feature lets you increase the length of time for touch responses on the screen.
- Third-party keyboards are supported.
- The ability to speak your passwords is included.
- An accessibility shortcut is available that you can use to quickly change your accessibility settings.
- Teletypewriter (TTY) support allows you to connect to a TTY device to make and receive calls from TTY devices.
- Hearing aid compatibility is available for certain BlackBerry smartphone models.
- The BlackBerry Keyboard lets you type more efficiently with contextual autocorrection, next-word prediction, and personalised learning that gets to know the way you type.

- If your device has a physical keyboard, keyboard shortcuts and speed dial allow you to assign actions and phone numbers to specific keys.
- If you are using PRIV, you have the option of using the touch screen keyboard, or the slide-out keyboard with tactilely discernible keys.
- Alerts and notifications can be customised using tone, vibration, onscreen alerts, or the LED indicator.
- An integrated hands-free speakerphone is available, or you can connect your device to a hands-free headset or Bluetooth enabled headset.


## Change accessibility settings

You can turn accessibility settings on or off, such as Google™ TalkBack, captions, touch & hold delay, and colour inversion.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Accessibility**.
3. Set the accessibility options switches.

## Turn on Hearing Aid mode


Hearing Aid mode is designed to improve the compatibility of your device with a hearing aid equipped with a telecoil. This feature might not be supported depending on your BlackBerry device model.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Accessibility**.
3. Turn on **Select to Speak** > **On/Off** switch.

## Turn on TTY support

TTY support is designed to allow your device to connect with an external TTY device that converts received calls to text.

The TTY device that you want to connect to your BlackBerry device must operate at 45.45 bps. If your TTY device is designed for use with a 2.5-mm headset jack, you must use an adapter accessory to connect your TTY device to your device. The adapter end that plugs into the TTY device must be a male three pole mono 2.5-mm headset jack, and the end that plugs into your BlackBerry device must be a male four pole stereo 3.5-mm headset jack.

1. Connect a TTY device to your device according to the instructions that came with your TTY device.
2. In the Phone app, in the upper-right corner of the screen, tap .
3. Tap **Settings** > **Accessibility** > **TTY mode**.
4. Select one of the following TTY modes:
  - To turn off all TTY settings, tap **TTY Off**.
  - To turn on all TTY settings, tap **TTY Full**.
  - To turn on TTY Hearing Carry Over mode, tap **TTY HCO**.
  - To turn on TTY Voice Carry Over mode, tap **TTY VCO**.

# Users

## About users

The users feature lets you share your device with others while keeping your personal or work information private. For example, users that you add to your device can't access your info, such as your email, contacts, pictures, apps, and more. By default, your device is set up with a device owner and a guest. You can also add more user profiles to your device.

To improve privacy between users, each user should set up a screen lock. A screen lock prevents another user from accessing information in a different user profile.

All user profiles use the wireless connection information set up on the device. Any changes that a user makes to some device settings, such as Wi-Fi network connections, are available or applied to all users on the device.

All users can install app updates for any user on the device.

### You (owner)

The person who sets up the device for the first time (you) is the device owner. You can add up to three users in addition to the device owner and a guest, and set whether the guest or user can use the device to make calls or send text messages. You control whether someone can add and access a user from the lock screen. You can also install app updates for all users on the device, uninstall apps from a user profile, and delete a user from the device.

### Guest

You can use the guest profile to let someone borrow your device. When someone uses the guest profile, the device creates a separate space where the guest can download apps, take pictures, and use other device features. Apps and data added to your device by the guest are only available from the guest profile. When you or the guest delete the guest profile, the apps and data in the guest profile are permanently deleted from the device.

You control whether the guest can make and receive phone calls.


### User

While the guest profile allows you to let someone borrow your device occasionally, you can create a user profile for someone that you share your device with frequently. A user profile creates a separate space on the device where another person can use device features and customise the device to their liking. For example, you might want to create a "kids" user profile that contains child-friendly apps. When a child wants to use your device, you can switch to the "kids" user profile and not worry that your apps or data might accidentally be deleted or changed. Apps and data added to the device by the user are only available from the user profile.


You control whether the user can make and receive phone calls, and whether the user can send and receive text messages (SMS).

## Add user

A user profile creates a separate space on your device for another person to use and customise. For example, the user can add a Google™ account or download apps, wallpaper, and music without seeing the device owner or other users' account info, apps, and data.


1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Users & accounts** > **Users** > **Add user**.
3. Tap **OK**.
4. Tap **SET UP NOW**.
5. If necessary, to wake up your device, swipe up from the bottom of the screen.
6. Complete the instructions on the screen.

## Switch users

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen once using two fingers, or twice using one finger.
2. Tap user icon .
3. Do any of the following:
  - tap a user
  - tap a guest


## Allow access to guest and user profiles when your device is locked



Guests and users can access their profiles from the lock screen if you set up your device to allow this feature. This feature also lets you add a user from the lock screen without having to unlock the screen first.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Security & Location** > **Lock screen preferences**.
3. If necessary, enter your current password, PIN, or pattern.
4. Turn on **Add users from lock screen** switch.

## Allow a user to make calls and send text messages




You can set whether a guest or user can make or receive calls when they use the guest profile or a user profile on your device. You can also set whether a user can send or receive text messages (SMS).



1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Users & accounts** > **Users**.

3. Do any of the following:
  - Beside the guest profile, tap . Tap the **Turn on phone calls** switch.
  - Beside a user profile, tap . Tap the **Turn on phone calls & SMS** switch.

## Delete a user or guest

When you delete a user from your device, you permanently delete the user's space and all of the apps and data in it. The user is no longer available from the list of users. When you delete a guest, all of the apps and data in the guest space are permanently deleted, but the guest profile remains on the device.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Users & accounts** > **Users**.
3. Do one of the following:
  - Beside the user you want to delete, tap  > **Remove user** > **DELETE**.
  - Tap **Guest**. If necessary, tap **YES, CONTINUE**. Swipe down from the top of the screen. Tap  > **Users & accounts** > **Users** > **Remove guest** > **REMOVE**.

A guest or a user can delete the apps and data from the guest space or user profile space on your device. A guest can tap  > **Delete Guest from this device**. A user can tap  > **Delete <username> from this device**.

## Backup and reset

### About backing up device data


Each method for backing up the data on your device backs up different types of data. Consider using a combination of these methods to back up your data.

Backup method	Description
Android™ Backup Service	<p>With Android™ Backup Service, you can back up your data to your Google™ account. If you must replace your device unexpectedly (for example, if your device is damaged, lost, or stolen), you can restore your data on a device running Android™.</p> <p>The following types of data can be backed up to a Google™ account:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Google Calendar™ settings</li> <li>• Wi-Fi networks and passwords</li> <li>• Home screen wallpapers</li> <li>• Gmail™ settings</li> <li>• Apps installed on Google Play™</li> <li>• Display settings</li> <li>• Language and input settings</li> <li>• Date and time settings</li> <li>• Third-party app settings and data (depending on the app)</li> </ul>
Transfer files to your computer	<p>You can connect your device to your computer using a USB cable, view your device's files in your computer's file manager, and copy the files (such as pictures and documents) to your computer. This is a manual process. BlackBerry does not provide desktop software for Android™ devices.</p>
Use a third-party backup service	<p>The Google Play™ store includes many apps that provide backup services. BlackBerry cannot guarantee the security or trustworthiness of these apps, so use caution when considering a third-party backup service.</p>

## Back up and restore data using Android™ Backup Service

### Turn on Android™ Backup Service

After you turn on Android™ Backup Service, your data is backed up automatically every 24 hours when your device is plugged in, idle, and connected to a Wi-Fi network.


1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **System** > **Backup**.
3. Turn on the **Back up to Google Drive** switch.

After you turn on Android™ Backup Service, if you reset your device or switch to another Android™ device, your data is restored when you add the Google™ account that you used to back up your data to your device.




## Change the Google™ account that you use to back up device data

If you have more than one Google™ account, or if you start using a new Google™ account, you can change the account that you use to back up your data.


1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **System** > **Backup** > **Account**.
3. Tap an account.

If you haven't added the account to your device yet, then follow the prompts to add the account.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **System** > **Backup**.
3. tap **Account** > **Add account**.

## Automatically restore app data

If you uninstall an app and then reinstall it later, your device can automatically restore the app data if the app has opted in to use Android™ Backup Service. App data can be restored as long as you're using the same Google™ account on your device.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **System** > **Backup**.
3. Turn on the **Back up to Google Drive** switch.

## Check which apps are backed up


Not all apps opt in to use Android™ Backup Service to back up application data. You can check which apps are backed up in Google Drive™.

In the Google Drive™ app, tap  > **Settings** > **Manage backups**.

## Delete your device data with a factory reset

Before you switch to a new device or give away your current device, you should delete your data. A factory reset is designed to delete all of the data on your device permanently so that it can't be recovered. The permanently deleted data includes email accounts, downloaded apps, media files, documents, browser bookmarks, and settings.

**Important:** If you delete your device data in any other way, for example, by entering the screen lock incorrectly ten times, when your device restarts, it will not work again until you enter your Google™ account credentials. After a factory reset, you do not need to enter your Google™ account credentials.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **System** > **Reset options**.
3. Tap **Factory data reset** > **RESET PHONE**.

4. If necessary, enter your screen lock.
5. When prompted, tap **ERASE EVERYTHING**.


## I can't get out of safe mode

To get out of safe mode, press and hold the **Power on/off** key (on the right side of your device). Tap **Restart**.

## Update your device software

Updating your device software to the latest version can help your device stay secure and run as expected.

Do one of the following:

1. To update your device software when a notification appears, swipe down from the top of the screen using one finger. On the system update notification, tap **Install**.
2. To update your device software manually.
  - Swipe down from the top of the screen.
  - tap  > **System** > **System Updates** > **CHECK FOR UPDATES NOW**. If an update is available, tap **Restart & install**.

**Note:** Major updates can take time to download and install and require that you restart your device. To help prevent issues, keep your device connected to a power source and a reliable Wi-Fi network while the update is in progress.

# Security

## Locks, passwords, and protecting your data

There are several types of locks, PINs, and security features that you can use to help protect the data on your device.

If you use your device for work, your organisation might have security rules in place. The organisation might require you to enter a password to unlock your device or might prevent you from using the Smart Lock feature.

### Screen lock

A screen lock helps prevent someone else from unlocking your device and accessing your data. When you set up a screen lock, you set whether the screen lock must be entered to turn on the device.

Some security features, such as Smart Lock, require that you set up a screen lock before you can set up the feature.

There are several types of screen locks to choose from. Each type is designed to provide a different level of security.

- **Password:** A secure password can contain letters, numbers, and symbols. A password is designed to be a strong screen lock that is difficult for someone else to figure out.
- **PIN:** A PIN must contain a minimum of four numbers. The more numbers there are in your PIN, the more secure your screen lock.
- **Pattern:** A pattern is a continuous line that connects four or more dots on a grid. You trace your pattern to unlock your device.
- **Swipe:** A swipe gesture can unlock your device.

### Smart Lock

The Smart Lock feature lets you set up your device to remain unlocked when it's connected to a trusted Bluetooth enabled device or NFC-enabled device, when it recognises your face or voice, or when you are carrying it in your hand, pocket, or bag. The Smart Lock feature also allows your device to remain unlocked when it's in a familiar location, such as your home or workplace.

The Smart Lock feature is a convenient way to access the data on your device, but it doesn't confirm that the device owner is the person using the device.

You must have a screen lock set before you can set up the Smart Lock feature.

### Data encryption

By default, data on your device, including your account information, apps, music, pictures, and other downloaded files, is stored in a format that can be read only when your device decrypts the data. If you set up a screen lock and require that it must be entered to turn on your device, your password, PIN, or pattern is used to generate a new encryption key to decrypt your data.

## SIM card PIN

You can set up a PIN for your SIM card, which you can use to help prevent unauthorised use of your SIM card in another device. For example, if you lose your SIM card and someone tries to use it in another device, the SIM card can't be used unless the PIN is entered correctly.

## Network lock and unlock codes

To use a SIM card from another service provider, for example, if you're travelling and want to use a local service provider's network, you can request unlock codes (MEP codes) from your current service provider. After you insert the new SIM card, enter the unlock code.

If you exceed the number of allowed attempts to enter an unlock code, your SIM card allows emergency calls only. For assistance, contact your service provider.

## Google™ account and factory reset protection

The factory reset protection feature uses your Google™ account information to help protect the data on your device. If your device is lost or stolen, the factory reset protection feature is designed to prevent someone else from being able to set up your device for use, even if that person tries to reset your device to its factory settings. The device must be set up using the same Google™ account information that was set up on the device before it was reset.


To use the factory reset protection feature, you must set up a screen lock and you must add your Google™ account to your device.

## Set up or change a screen lock

Locking your device can help prevent your device from sending accidental messages or pocket dialling. Before you can unlock your device and access the data on your device, you must enter your password, PIN, or pattern, or swipe the screen.

If you use your device for work, depending on the rules set up by your administrator, you might not be able to use a pattern or swipe gesture to unlock your device.



**Note:** Using a swipe gesture to unlock your screen is not a secure way to prevent others from accessing the data and features on your device.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Security & Location** > **Screen lock**.
3. If necessary, enter your current password, PIN, or pattern.
4. Tap the type of screen lock that you want to use.
5. Complete the instructions on the screen.

## Set your screen lock options

After you set up a screen lock for your device, you can set up your screen lock options. For example, you can set how long your device can be inactive before it automatically locks and whether your device automatically deletes your device data if you enter your password incorrectly ten times.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.

2. Tap  > **Security & Location** >  beside **Screen lock**.
3. Do any of the following:
  - To lock your device automatically after a certain amount of inactive time, tap **Automatically lock**, and then tap an interval.
  - To lock your device when you press the **Power on/off** key, turn on the **Power key instantly locks** switch.
  - To delete your device data automatically after ten unsuccessful attempts to unlock the device, turn on the **Automatically wipe** switch.
  - To display a message or owner information on the screen when the device is locked, tap **Lock screen message**. Type the info to display, and then tap **SAVE**.

**Tip:** To hide your password, PIN, or pattern so that it is not visible when you unlock your screen, turn off the **Security & Location** > **Show passwords** switch.

## Creating a strong password

A strong password helps prevent someone else from accessing your information. Weak passwords, such as 1234, might be easy to remember but they're easier to guess as well.

To create a strong password, avoid using a password with the following characteristics (in order of importance):

Avoid	Example
Common passwords	password
Words from a dictionary	quarter
Combining words from a dictionary	SimpleGraph
Names or addresses	Cecilia
Adding numbers at the end of a word	password145

The key is to create a strong password that you can remember easily. Consider the following tips:

Do	Example
Use as many characters as you can remember	—
Combine words from different languages	field of Kühe Instead of: field of cows
Mix character sets	größere3 stre4gth
Use the first letter from each word in a sentence	Tqbfjotld Instead of: The quick brown fox jumps over the lazy dog
Combine misspelled words	SimzleGarph Instead of: SimpleGraph

# About Smart Lock

The Smart Lock feature makes it easy for you to unlock your device. You can set up your device to remain unlocked in the following situations:


- When your device is connected to a trusted Bluetooth enabled device or NFC-enabled device
- When your device is in a familiar location, such as your home or workplace
- When your device recognises your face or voice
- When you carry your device in your hand, pocket, or bag

The Smart Lock feature can't detect who is holding your device when the device is unlocked and connected to a trusted device, in a trusted location, or passed between people while on-body detection is turned on. It might also be possible for someone who looks like you to unlock your device when you turn on the trusted face option.


If you use your device for work, depending on the rules set by your administrator, the Smart Lock feature might not be available.

## Set up Smart Lock to unlock your device

Make sure that you have set a screen lock on your device. Depending on the type of Smart Lock you set up, you might need to turn on or set up other features on your device, such as Bluetooth technology, NFC, Google Maps™, "Ok Google™" voice detection, a trust agent, or a wireless network connection.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Security & Location** > **Smart Lock**.
3. Enter your password, PIN, or pattern, and then tap **Next**.
4. Do any of the following:
  - To keep your device unlocked when you carry it on your body or in a bag, tap **On-body detection**, and then turn on the switch.
  - To keep your device unlocked when it detects it is at home or at another trusted location, tap **Trusted places**.
  - To keep your device unlocked when it is connected to a Bluetooth enabled device, when you tap an NFC tag, or when you tap an NFC-enabled device, tap **Trusted devices**.
  - To unlock your device when it recognises your face, tap **Trusted face**.
  - To unlock your device when you say "OK Google™," tap **Voice Match**. If necessary, turn on the **From the Google app** switch. Turn on the **From any screen** switch. If necessary, set up the "OK Google™" voice detection feature, and then turn on the **Voice Match** switch.
5. Complete the instructions on the screen.


## Turn off Smart Lock

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Security & Location** > **Smart Lock**.
3. Enter your password, pattern, or PIN, and then tap **Next**.

4. Do any of the following:
  - Tap **Trusted devices**. Tap a device, and then tap **Remove trusted device**.
  - Tap **Trusted places**. Tap a location, and then tap **Turn off this location**.
  - Tap **Trusted face**. Tap **Remove trusted face**, and then tap **Remove**.
  - Tap **Voice Match**. Turn off the **Voice Match** switch.
  - Tap **On-body detection**. Turn off the switch.
5. If you turn off all of your Smart Lock settings, you should also turn off the Smart Lock trust agent:
  - a. Go back to the Security screen and tap **Trust agents**.
  - b. Turn off the **Smart Lock (Google)** switch.


## Protect your SIM card with a PIN

You can use a SIM card PIN to help prevent unauthorised use of your SIM card in another device. For example, if you lose your SIM card and someone tries to use it in another device, the SIM card can't be used unless the PIN is entered correctly. After you set up a PIN for your SIM card, you must enter the PIN from the lock screen to use your device.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Security & Location** > **SIM card lock**.
3. Turn on the **Lock SIM card** switch.
4. Type a PIN, and then tap **OK**.

To remove the PIN from your SIM card, turn off the **Lock SIM card** switch. Type the PIN for your SIM card, and then tap **OK**.

## Change the PIN for your SIM card

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Security & Location** > **SIM card lock**.
3. Tap **Change SIM PIN**.
4. Follow the instructions on the screen.


## About smart cards

Smart cards store certificates and private keys. You can import certificates from a smart card to your device by using an external smart card reader or a microSD smart card. Private key operations such as signing and decryption use the smart card. Public key operations such as verification and encryption use the public certificates on your device.


You can use smart card certificates with third-party apps that support smart card technology. And you can use smart card certificates to send S/MIME-protected messages.

## Store your smart card password on your device

You can set up your device to store your smart card password temporarily, so that you don't have to enter it as often. To remove the password from your device cache, lock your device.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Security & Location** > **Smart Card**.
3. Turn on the **PIN Caching** switch.

## Set or change the PIN for your smart card reader

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Security & Location** > **Smart Card**.
3. Tap a smart card reader.
4. Do one of the following:
  - Tap **Set PIN**.
  - Tap **Change PIN**.
5. Complete the instructions on the screen.

## Troubleshooting: Locks, passwords, and protecting your data

### I forgot my password, PIN, or pattern



For security reasons, the only way that you can reset your screen lock without knowing the password, PIN, or pattern is to delete all of your device data and set up the device again.

You can typically do this by entering your password, PIN, or pattern incorrectly ten times. Or, if you have a remote device management app installed on your device, such as the Android™ Device Manager, you can log in to the website and delete your device data.

If you add your Google™ account to your device, the factory reset protection feature is turned on. To set up your device again, you must add the same Google™ account. If you don't use the same Google™ account, you can't complete the setup process.

### Smart Lock doesn't unlock my device as expected

Try any of the following:

- If your device doesn't unlock when you scan your face, try to improve the image Smart Lock uses to recognise your face. Tap  > **Security & Location** > **Smart Lock** > **Trusted face** > **Improve face matching**.
- Adjust the distance between your BlackBerry device and a trusted Bluetooth enabled device. The distance of a Bluetooth connection can vary depending on your BlackBerry device model and the Bluetooth enabled device.
- If your device remains unlocked when it is close to a trusted location instead of when you are at the trusted location, try improving the accuracy of the trusted location. Delete the trusted location. Tap  > **Security & Location** > **Location** > **Mode**. Tap **High accuracy** or **Battery saving**, and then add the trusted location again. Your device might detect a trusted location outside of the physical walls of a building, such as your house. Smart Lock might keep your device unlocked when it is within an 80-metre radius of a trusted location.




- You might need to unlock your device using your screen lock the first time you connect to a trusted device or arrive at a trusted location.

## Locker

The Locker app is designed to help you hide and protect your photos, apps, and sensitive files.


### Set Locker security password

To access your Locker, you first need to set up security validation.

1. Tap  > **Locker**.
2. Input Enter password.
3. Input Confirm password.



### Add fingerprint

If you have added fingerprint, you can also enter Locker using fingerprint verification.



1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Security & Location** > **Fingerprint** > **Add fingerprint**.
3. Place your finger on the Space key (Fingerprint sensor) and lift after you feel a vibration.
4. Repeat step 3, moving your finger slightly to add all the different parts of your fingerprint.
5. Tap **Done**.

**Note:** Make sure to remember your password because, even if you use fingerprint recognition, you will still need to enter it in some cases.

### Add photos and files to Locker

1. Tap  > **Photos** or **Files**.
2. Tap a photo or a file to view it.
3. Tap  > **Copy to Locker/Move to Locker**.

### Remove photos and files from Locker

1. Tap  > **Locker**.
2. Tap **Gallery** or **Files**.
3. Tap a photo or tap and hold to select a file.
4. Tap  > **Yes** or **Move out**.

# Finding and protecting a lost device

## What to do if your device is lost or stolen

If you have a remote device management app, such as Android™ Device Manager, set up on your device, visit the remote device management website and sign in. Depending on the remote device management app installed on your device, you might be able to:

- Lock your device
- Make your device ring
- Add a phone number or message to the home screen of your device
- View the approximate location of your device on a map
- Delete all of the data on your device


If your device is not connected to the wireless network or if data services are turned off, you should still try to lock your device and delete your device data. The next time your device connects to a wireless network, or data services are turned on, your device is designed to lock and delete all the data.

If you don't have a remote device management app set up on your device, contact your service provider or your administrator and report that your device is lost or stolen. Your service provider can lock your device remotely and delete your data. If you use your device for work, your administrator might also be able to lock your device and delete your data.

If you suspect your device was stolen and you locate your device using a remote device management website, contact the local law enforcement agency to retrieve your device. Don't try to retrieve your device on your own.

## Set a device administrator

By default, the Android™ Device Manager is set up as the device administrator for your device. If you download a third-party remote device management app to help you find your device or protect your device data, you must set the app as a device administrator.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Security & Location** > **Device administrators**.
3. Enable an app's checkbox.

## About Android™ Device Manager


Android™ Device Manager includes features designed to help you find your device and help protect the data on your device if your device is lost or stolen.

On the [Android Device Manager website](#), you can view the approximate location of your device on a map, make it ring, set a password to lock your device and display a message on the lock screen, or delete all of the data from your device. If your device is turned off, doesn't have a valid SIM card in it, or isn't connected to the wireless network, the Android™ Device Manager will complete the request the next time your device is turned on and connected to the wireless network.

The Android™ Device Manager app is preloaded on your device. If someone you know loses an Android™ device, you can let that person log in to the Android™ Device Manager app to try to find the lost device.

## Change your Android™ Device Manager settings

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Security & Location** > **Find My Device**.
3. Do any of the following:
  - Tap **Find My Devices** to install the app from Google Play™
  - Tap **Web** to visit [android.com/find](https://android.com/find)
  - Tap **Google** to search for "find my device"

# Security settings

## About app permissions

When you download an app that is designed for Android™ 6.0 or later, you can install the app on your device without accepting any app permissions. When you use the app, the app prompts you for permission to access certain data or features on your device before it completes an action. For example, if the BlackBerry Hub wants to access your contacts, you can allow or deny the permission request.


You can also turn a permission on or off at any time, although some features of the app might not then be available. In some cases, turning off a permission can prevent the app from working properly, or the app might not work at all. For example, if you turn off microphone access for the BlackBerry Keyboard, the voice dictation feature doesn't work. If you turn off camera access for the BlackBerry Camera, the app doesn't work at all.


When you download an app designed for an earlier version of the Android™ OS, you must accept all permissions before you can successfully install the app. If you install the app, and then later don't want the app to have access to a permission, turning off a permission stops the app from working correctly. If you don't want the app to have access to a permission, you should uninstall the app from your device.

## Turn a permission on or off for an app

You can turn a permission on or off to control what features or personal information an app or an Android™ OS system service can access. When you turn off a permission, depending on the app, the app might continue working, but some features of the app might not be available. The app might also stop working properly, or the app might not work at all.

If you use your device for work, your administrator might control which permissions you can change.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Apps & notifications** > **App permissions**.

3. Do one of the following:
  - To view the permissions for an app, tap the app.
  - To view the permissions for an Android™ OS system app or service, tap  > **Show system**, and then tap the app or service.
4. Tap an app.
5. Turn on or off a permission switch.

To see a list of apps and system services that access a specific type of permission, from the Apps & notification screen, tap **Special app access**, and then tap a permission.


## Download apps from sources other than Google Play™

Google Play™ is the default trusted source for downloading Android™ apps onto your device.



You can set up your device to let you download apps onto your device from other websites and sources. If you want to download apps from other sources, you should also set up your device to scan for malicious app activity.

### Scan device for malicious activity

You can set up your device to scan periodically for malicious activities. Your device warns you about potentially harmful app activity.


1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Security & Location** > **Google Play Protect**.
3. Turn on the **Scan device for security threats** switch.

## About screen pinning

Screen pinning lets you pin one app into the foreground on your device. The feature disables the  and  buttons on your device so that the only way to close a pinned app is to unpin the screen. You can set up screen pinning so that you must enter your screen lock to unpin the screen.

Screen pinning allows you to let someone else use your device, for example, to play a game or view a video, without worrying that the person might close the app and access your data.



### Turn on screen pinning

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Security & Location** > **Screen pinning**.
3. Turn on the switch.
4. To unpin a screen without entering your screen lock, turn off the **Ask for password/PIN/pattern before unpinning** switch.

To turn off the screen pinning feature, turn off the switch.

## Pin a screen


Make sure that you have turned on the screen pinning feature.

1. Open an app or a screen that you want to pin to the foreground of your device.
2. Tap .
3. On the app or screen that you want to pin, tap .

To unpin a screen, touch and hold . If necessary, enter your screen lock.


## Install a certificate

Some Wi-Fi and VPN networks require your device to have a security certificate before the device can connect to the network. You can install a certificate to help identify your device. Typically, when you install a client certificate, a certification authority (CA) certificate is installed on your device at the same time.

1. Connect your device to your computer using a USB cable.
2. Copy the certificate or keystore to the root of the internal storage space on your media card.
3. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
4. Tap  > **Security & Location** > **Encryption & credentials** > **Install from SD card**.  
Your device only displays certificates and keystores that are not already installed on your device.
5. Find and tap the certificate or keystore that you want to install.
6. If necessary, type the password for the certificate or keystore, and then tap **OK**.  
After the certificate or keystore is installed, your device deletes the copy of the file on your device or media card.
7. Type a name to identify the certificate or keystore.
8. In the **Credential use** drop-down list, tap an option.
9. Tap **OK**.

## Remove or turn off a certificate

When you remove a certificate that you've installed, it is deleted from your device. If you require the certificate again, you must reinstall it. When you turn off a system certificate, you can turn it on again.


1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Security & Location** > **Encryption & credentials** > **Trusted credentials**.
3. Do one of the following:
  - To view a list of installed certificates, tap the **USER** tab.
  - To view a list of system certificates, tap the **SYSTEM** tab.
4. Tap a certificate.

5. Do one of the following:
  - To remove an installed certificate, tap **REMOVE**.
  - To turn off a system certificate, tap **DISABLE**.

To turn on a certificate that you turned off, on the **SYSTEM** tab, tap the certificate. On the bottom of the certificate information screen, tap **ENABLE**.

## Turn off access to the usage info for apps

Some apps and services monitor the active apps on your device. If you turn off access to this info, some apps might not work correctly.

1. Swipe down from the top of the screen.
2. Tap  > **Security & Location** > **Apps with usage access**.
3. Tap an app and then turn off the **Permit usage access** switch.

## Improving your security settings using DTEK

The **DTEK by BlackBerry** app is designed to help you monitor and control the level of security on your BlackBerry device. DTEK is preloaded on your device, and updates are available from the Google Play™ store.

### Evaluating how security features are set up on your device

DTEK evaluates how or if you have set up security features on your device, including screen lock, factory reset protection, and remote device management.

DTEK assigns an overall security rating to your device along with a rating for each of the security features that it monitors. If a security feature receives a poor or fair rating, DTEK recommends how you can improve your security settings to achieve a better rating.

### Monitoring how apps access your data

DTEK lets you see and control which third-party apps use features on your device to access your info. DTEK doesn't monitor preloaded apps or apps that your administrator might push to your device if you use your device for work.

DTEK monitors apps that:

- Take a picture or video using the camera
- Read, create, edit, or delete a contact
- Access the location of your device
- Send a text message (SMS or MMS) from your device
- Turn the microphone on or off

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
